What is a visual timetable?

A visual timetable is a series of pictures that illustrate the daily routine - each activity is represented with a separate picture. Place the pictures in a prominent position where your child can clearly see and access them. The pictures can read from left to right, or top-to-bottom. To prevent the timetable from getting too long, just show half a day's (morning or afternoon) activities and change the timetable at lunchtime.

## Helping your child to understand the daily routine:

Spend a few minutes at the beginning of the morning with your child putting the pictures on the timetable together and talking about the day.

- Decide on an area where it will be kept this may be on the fridge door or in the hallway - somewhere that is easy to access and frequently check.
