What are SATs?

➤ Government requirement to assess where each child is in relation to the National Standard.

> Results are issued in July.

Results are sent home with the Year 6 annual school report.

How are results reported?

- Each child's raw score will be converted into a scaled score.
- > This relates the raw score to the National Standard.
- > There are three possible scaled scores:
 - 100 Expected Standard (EXS)
 - 110 Greater Depth Standard (GDS)
 - <100 Working Towards the expected standard (WTS)

Children are assessed in the following:

> Maths

Reading

> Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar

Writing

Science Teacher Assessment

In 2024, schools will need to make and submit Teacher Assessment judgements for pupils:

- working at the standard
- not working at the standard




Maths – The children will sit three tests.

- Paper 1 is an Arithmetic test.
- > Mental and written calculation strategies.
- > 30 minutes means they need to work at pace.
- > The questions generally get harder.



Maths

- Paper 2 and Paper 3 test reasoning skills and application of the Maths curriculum.
- > No calculators
- Some short answer, some explanation and some multi-stage questions.



Writing

- No SATs test.
- > Assessed throughout the year by class teacher.
- > Assessments entered by the end of May.
- Writing includes all English, Topic work, Science etc.
- > A selection of schools are moderated.
- > Children are assessed to be:
 - > Working towards the expected standard
 - Working at the expected standard
 - > Working at Greater Depth.


How do we prepare for SATs at The Rackham?


- Hall practice;

- All lessons are planned carefully to ensure all elements covered.


Finally, how can you best help your child?
