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Dear Parents and Carers,

To ensure these arrangements work effectively and minimise the risk of compromising families' Easter break, please adhere to the following:

- LFD tests that are used by key workers and secondary aged pupils are not suitable for primary aged children. A full PCR test is always required for primary aged children, when symptoms are apparent.
- Parents should seek PCR tests via testing centres rather than via postal tests as this can significantly delay confirmation of results. Results are normally forthcoming in 24 hours via test centres.
- Parents to notify the school if children have symptoms after Friday 26th March (as outlined above) even when waiting for a test result, we can advise families to take necessary steps whilst awaiting confirmation.
- To minimise the risk of infection within the school (and the wider community) please ensure you continue to adhere to social distancing, frequent hand washing and use of face coverings protocol.

I wish all of our community a very restful and enjoyable Easter, and look forward to welcoming our pupils back again on 12th April for the Summer term.
