### **Adventures**


As part of the social development aspect of Ready to Learn students often go off site to explore and learn about the world around them.

This time we came across some interesting 'installations' which the students were enthralled by!

### English

This half term in English, Year 9/10 have been looking at Crime and Punishment as part of their preparation for the GCSE Non-Fiction unit. They have read a number of texts including an extract from Charles Bronson's autobiography and the background to the Derek Bentley case. Students have also written a formal letter to the Prime Minister about the poor conditions in the UK's prisons and an informal letter to a family member, explaining life inside HMP Strangeways prior to the riots.

## **Forest School**

This term, our Forest School students used the bow drill firelighting technique. A bow drill is an advanced fire lighting technique using friction. A bow drill uses a bow to rotate a spindle of wood into a base board. The heat generated from the friction is used to ignite the tinder. The type of wood used is very important to the success of the process. All of our Forest School students at Ramsden Hall Academy have had the opportunity to try this advanced technique for fire-lighting.












### Science Trip
