



This academic year we have been able to open our doors to our community, for the first-time post pandemic, and it has been fantastic to welcome everyone inside our wonderful school. We have been able to host a very successful 'Open Evening' back in September, a parents and carers celebration evenings for Year 10, and a wonderful Year 11 preparation evening as they begin their final year with us at Rayner Stephens. Just last week our student council did us proud by hosting the local residents from The Beeches Care Home and all our year 7 parents to a lovely Christmas afternoon tea party, and it was wonderful to see so much good spirit in the room. During these times of struggle for many of us, we were still able to demonstrate the community spirit and generosity amongst our families and were blown away by the amount of donations that were made into our food bank collection which will all support local families over the Christmas period.

I must also take this opportunity to draw your attention to the amazing local initiative, 'The Christmas Gift Appeal' organised by Astley Sports Village and Mark Storie which saw the biggest collection to date of gifts. Over 800 presents have been donated and wrapped, which will go to support 54 families and a total of 180 local children, all who will now receive gifts on Christmas morning. It is this sort of community spirit, generosity and humility shown by the students, staff and families of Rayner Stephens that makes me immensely proud to be the Head. Multi-million pound investment in new arts centre

Rayner Stephens are so excited to have been given the green light for our state of the art new facilities, coming in September 2023. The investment will give students access to industry standard drama studio and music rooms alongside a modern airy art studio.

Stamford Park Trust, in collaboration with Tameside Council, is investing over £1.5 million to ensure students at Rayner Stephens have access to the best facilities, to inspire their love of learning and interests outside of the curriculum.

The improvements are just one in the programme of improvements the school has seen since joining Stamford Park Trust in 2021, which are already having a significant and positive impact on the lives of our students.

It is an exciting time to join Rayner Stephens High School. Progress is happening across the whole school with a clear focus on positive praise and recognition, excellent behaviour for learning, investment in facilities, engaging teaching and an extensive and exciting enrichment and aspiration offers for students. This year, GCSE and equivalent qualifications were the best in the schools history.

Stamford Park Trust gives us the opportunity to do things differently, to develop and form collaborative approaches to teaching and learning to provide an out standing quality of education to all students in the Trust.

The new Creative Arts Centre will be ready for use in 2023 and will provide the perfect spaces and opportunities for students to develop their talents and interests in the creative arts.

Students lead on help the homeless campaign

Over the course of the past year, some of our Year 8 and Year 9 students have trained up to become peer mentors. This has allowed them to work closely with some of our feeder primary schools to enable the transition from primary to secondary more smooth and

enjoyable for all.

As of September, a number of Year 7 students were invited to join the peer mentor group and they have spent time weekly working on a social action project. The project they decided to run was a 'Help The Homeless' one, looking at raising awareness of what homelessness is and what we can do as a community to support people who find themselves in this situation.





On Tuesday 6th December, the group went to Manchester Metropolitan University to spend the day with industry experts and the staff from PIE (Pursuing Individual Excellence) to create digital and creative content to help support their campaign. As part of this day they were also lucky enough to have a tour around campus and ask students at MMU what life is actually like as a university student.

On the day, our students created a podcast, explaining what their help the homeless campaign was about and interviewing members of

the public about their thoughts and views on it, creating video and photo media to support their online posters, writing a campaign song, creating tote bags, t-shirts, keyrings and bracelets and also creating leaflets and fliers to support their messages.
