Curriculum intent	From Year 8, our learners will be building on their knowledge from KS2 and Year 7 through a systematic exposure to a wide range of high-quality literary texts. Year 7 developed their understanding of the threshold concepts of narratology, characterisation, setting, form & structure, which underpin the study of English, in Year 8 they will be building on this knowledge by examining genre, symbolism, representation and rhetoric. Some incredibly challenging texts and concepts are explored through accessible and relatable ideas, pushing students to think outside of the box and develop their own bourgeoning opinions on the written word.

Knowledge	<ul> <li>Genre, Form &amp; Style</li> <li>Learners will be introduced to what we mean by genre and style in</li> <li>English before going on to explore the gothic genre.</li> <li>Throughout the unit learners will explore key gothic conventions with a focused study on gothic narratology, characterisation and setting.</li> <li>Learners will explore the following: <ul> <li>Literary genres contain key recognisable conventions.</li> <li>Origins of the gothic genre</li> <li>Conventions of gothic literature</li> <li>Settings establish genre and mood and reflect characters in the gothic genre</li> <li>The role of the narrators as an established character.</li> <li>Characters are constructs of a writer</li> <li>Texts can take different forms</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Imagery, Symbolism &amp; Representation</li> <li>Learners now begin to look how writers consciously craft their writing to include imagery, symbolism and how characters can sometimes act as representations of political/philosophical ideologies through the novel Animal Farm.</li> <li>Specifically learners will learn about:</li> <li>Texts as a conscious construct</li> <li>Context as a concept</li> <li>Characters can symbolise historical figures</li> <li>Characters can represent historical figures</li> <li>Texts contain symbols that represent larger ideologies within society.</li> <li>Texts can attempt to influence a reader</li> </ul>	RhetoricLearners will finish Year 8 by exploring the art of rhetoric. They will learn about Aristotle's system of rhetoric and explore the use of rhetoric in speeches from across the ages. Learners will study speeches from Julius Causer all the way through to Michelle Obama and eventually on to the Black Lives Matter Movement. They will conclude the year by studying:• Purpose, Audience, Form. • Conventions of rhetorical writing • Ethos/ Pathos/ Logos • Rhetorical linguistic devices • Form and structure of rhetorical writing• Different types of transactional writing
