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About the School Admissions and Appeals Team and this booklet

Hello!

We are Cumbria County Council's School Admissions and Appeals Team. Our job is to manage all the applications for school places at maintained schools and academies for children living in Cumbria, ensuring that all parents/carers who apply are offered a school place. This booklet will tell you how to apply for a school place, give you information about how the admissions process works and explain more about admissions to community and voluntary controlled schools where the County Council is the admissions authority. You will find that throughout the booklet there are some sentences that tell you what you must do. If the law says you **must** do something, we have to make sure that you understand that. We have tried throughout this booklet to keep the information simple, clear and easy to understand.

We talk about **preference** rather than **choice** because you can say on the application form which school **you would like** your child to attend, **but this is not the same as choosing the school your child will go to**. It does, however, encourage you to say which schools you would prefer.

Throughout the booklet we refer to 'schools'. This always includes academies unless otherwise stated. Every year we receive late applications and it is a shame that some children may miss out on their preferred school just because an application form is late. The law says that we must not allow for late applications unless there are exceptional reasons. So please do make sure your application is on time – why not start thinking about it and complete the online application form?

You'll probably be aware that 2 new councils – Cumberland and Westmorland & Furness – will replace Cumbria County Council on 1 April 2023.

We want to reassure you that this change will have no impact on the allocation of school places for September 2023. You should continue to make your application in the usual way, as set out in the published information.

Although Cumbria County Council will not exist after 31 March 2023, we are making arrangements to ensure that offers of primary, infant and junior school places are sent out on 17 April 2023. The only difference you might see is that you may be notified of the outcome of your application by one of the new councils, depending on where you live.

If you're applying for Year 7 places, you'll be notified of the outcome of your application on 1 March 2023 by Cumbria County Council, as usual. We'll also make sure that there are teams in place across the transition period to offer support and advice on applications or appeals.

How to apply for a school place

If you live in Cumbria and your child was born between 1 September 2018 and 31 August 2019, you must apply to Cumbria County Council (Local Authority) for a school place, under the Local Authority's Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme.

Please note: Attendance at a nursery which is attached to a school does not guarantee admission to that school.

Read through this booklet carefully before making an application. You can find details about each infant and primary school, including individual schools' admissions policies, and whether you also need to complete a supplementary form.

The online application form can be found on Cumbria County Council's website at:

The advantages of applying online are:

- You will receive an email confirmation to say your application has been received.
- You will be able to find out which school your child has been offered by **9.00am** on **17 April 2023**, before the letters are sent out to those who apply on a paper form.

If you are unable to apply online, you can download a form (SA1) from our website at: **www.cumbria.gov.uk/ schooladmissions**. If you do not have access to a computer you could ask your child's current school or your local library to help, or ring the number on page 2 and we will send a paper copy of the form to you. If you are completing a paper form, please write in **BLOCK CAPITAL LETTERS**.

However you decide to apply, you must state the address where your child lives. You must not use a business address, childminder's address or any address other than your child's home address.

We ask you to name three different preferences of school that you would be happy for your child to attend because we cannot guarantee that you will get your first preference.

On the application form you should give your first, second and third preferences. If you complete the form in such a way that the ranking of two or more schools is not clear, we will rank them for you.

To rank schools for you, we will use the Local Authority's GIS mapping system to measure the distance, using the shortest walking route by road between the pupil's home address and the nearest enterance on the school site available. The nearest school will be taken as the highest preference.



Some schools ask you to fill in a **supplementary form** with additional information they might need, for example a church school may ask you to prove that you are a regular worshipper. Copies of these supplementary forms are available from each school and should be available on the school's website. They are also available on Cumbria County Council's website at www.cumbria.gov.uk/ schooladmissions. You must return supplementary forms direct to the schools you are applying to. Please remember that if you are completing a supplementary form, you must also apply online or complete and return the paper application form (SA1). If you complete a supplementary form, please return it directly to the school.

If we receive more than one application from you by the closing date and you have not withdrawn any earlier applications in writing, we will use the one with the latest date. If forms are not dated, or are dated on the same day, we will rank those schools where the order of preference is not clear using the measurement criteria explained on page 5.

If you are applying using a paper form, you **must sign and date it**. In signing your form you are agreeing that you have read this information booklet, and that the information you have provided is accurate and truthful and that you agree, if it is necessary, for the Local Authority to seek independent verification of your child's residence. If you are at all unsure about any of the above information, please do not hesitate to contact the School Admissions and Appeals Team.

Make sure that you submit your application online, or if you use the printed version, return it to your child's current school by the closing date of 15 January 2023.

On 17 April 2023 we will send you an email by 9.00am (if you applied online) or post a letter to the address you have given us (if you have used a paper form). The email or letter will tell you where your child has been allocated a place. We will also explain what you must do next. If you are not happy with the place you have been allocated the letter will explain how you can appeal against the allocation. If your child has an Education, Health & Care Plan (EHCP) or you would like more information on Special Educational Needs please contact the SEND Team, details are on page 150.

In summary:

- Please read this booklet carefully before you make your application.
- You can apply online, or complete a paper application, but please do not do both.
- Make sure your application is submitted by 15 January 2023. The online application service will be available from 6 September 2022 until the closing date of 15 January 2023 at 11.59pm.
- If one of your preferred schools has a supplementary form, complete and return the form to them by 15 January 2023.
- We will email you the outcome of your application on 17 April 2023 if you apply online, or post a letter to you on this date if you apply using a paper form.
- If you or someone you know needs general advice about admissions, please contact the School Admissions and Appeals Team (contact details on page 2).

Information about starting school

When must my child begin their full-time education?

Your child must receive full time education from the start of the term after their fifth birthday. This is often called statutory or compulsory school age.

When can my child start school?

In Cumbria, children normally start full time primary education before reaching statutory school age. They can enter a Reception class at an infant or primary school the September after their fourth birthday. Some children have just turned four when they can start school and others are nearly five, but every child can receive seven years of primary education.

Can I delay my child's entry to school?

Yes. If you apply and are offered a Reception place, and your child has not reached statutory school age, the place will be held open for up to two terms. The place must be taken up once your child reaches statutory school age and will not be held open after the start of the summer term. Alternatively you may want your child to attend part time until they reach statutory school age. If you wish your child to attend school part-time or delay entry until they reach compulsory school age, please contact the Headteacher of the school where you are allocated a school place to discuss this.

If you are considering delaying your child's entry, you should apply by the closing date. If you apply late and the school is oversubscribed you may miss out on a place.

Do I need to consider anything else?

Most schools plan a careful induction to help children settle in to Reception. All of the children may not start at the same time. Attendance may be part time to begin with. All of this helps children to adjust to their new school and to being at school full time.

A child starting other than in September may miss the induction period. They may be the only child joining a settled group of children who have already got to know each other. Settling in may be more difficult, although staff would do all they could to minimise any problems.

What should I do if I am worried about my child starting school at the normal entry time?

You can contact the School Admissions and Appeals Team and/or you can talk to the staff at your child's nursery. You should also talk to the Headteacher of the school you would eventually prefer your child to attend. Reception teachers are experienced in dealing with young children and it may be possible to alleviate your concerns. Alternatively, it may be possible to agree to a longer induction period to help your child settle in. If you are considering later entry, you should still apply for a place in the usual way. This keeps your options open. It may also be that, by the time the normal entry date arrives, your child's progress has been such that you feel they are ready for school.

Summer born children

Parents/carers of children born between 1 April and 31 August can delay their child's admission until the following academic year, when they would enter Reception rather than their normal age group (i.e. year 1).

You will still have to make an application in the next admissions round before the closing date, and it will be considered alongside all other Reception applications for that year. A place in Reception would not be guaranteed at the preferred school.

We would advise you to seek the views of the Head teacher of your preferred school(s) and any other professionals who may be involved with your child to discuss any concerns and reasons for delaying your child's entry to Reception. Professionals in schools will be able to give advice to help parents/carers with their decision.

If you do decide to delay your child's admission, and s/he is already attending a nursery, you are advised to check whether a place would be available for them to continue into the next academic year.

Information about applying for a school place

What is the Coordinated Admissions Scheme?

The scheme explains how the Local Authority coordinates (manages) admissions with other neighbouring authorities and schools that are their own admission authority (foundation and voluntary aided schools, free schools and academies). The purpose of the scheme is to ensure that each pupil living within Cumbria receives only one offer of a school place, whether that is at a school within the county or one maintained by a neighbouring authority.

What are the different types of school?

The type of school you apply for affects the way decisions are made. For all types of school you must apply to the county council's School Admissions and Appeals Team for a place.

For **community and voluntary controlled schools** the county council is the admission authority – it decides the admissions policy and makes decisions about the allocation of places.

For **voluntary aided** and **foundation schools**, each school's governing body is responsible for the admissions policy and decisions about the allocation of places.

For **academies** and **free schools**, the academy trust is responsible for the admissions policy and decisions about the allocation of places.

The Local Authority is not responsible for allocation decisions made by voluntary aided, foundation or free schools or academies.

You can find out more about individual schools and what type they are in the schools information pages.

How are places allocated?

The School Admissions and Appeals Team collate all applications for school places from parents and carers of children living in Cumbria. We then start a process of liaising with foundation and voluntary aided schools, academies and free schools, and with neighbouring local authorities where necessary (for example if a family live close to the county boundary and want their child to attend a school in the neighbouring county). This process is called **coordination**.

Each admission authority (in the case of community and voluntary controlled schools this is the county council) then looks at all applications for their school, whether they have been named as a first, second or third preference. This is because all **preferences must be treated equally**.

This is known as the **equal preference scheme** and means that each of your preferences is treated as a separate application.

Each school has a **Published Admission Number (PAN)** which is the number of places that a school has available to offer. The allocation process is straightforward when a school is not oversubscribed – you are likely to get a place at your first preference school. Unfortunately, schools are sometimes oversubscribed and in this case admissions authorities need to work out who has highest priority for the places in a fair and consistent way. They do this by using the oversubscription criteria contained in their admissions policy to rank all the applicants in order of priority.

If it is possible to offer a place at more than one of your preference schools, we will offer a place at whichever of those schools that you ranked the highest that has a place available for your child.

If it is not possible to offer you a place at any of your preferred schools, you will be offered a place at the nearest school with a place available. We will decide which is the nearest by measuring the shortest walking route by road using the Local Authority GIS mapping system.

How likely am I to get my first preference?

In Cumbria you are very likely to get your first preference. Last year over 98% of parents were offered their first preference. You cannot however assume you will be offered your first preference of school. There are always schools that are very popular for many different reasons and those schools tend to have more applications than there are places available. **This is why it is important to put the names of three different schools on your application form**. If we cannot offer you any of your preferred schools, we will offer an alternative school so naming 3 preferences means that you have a better chance of being offered a school you have selected yourself. The law says that we must only do this after all applications from parents who have included the school as one of their preferences have been considered. This means that if you name only one school and we cannot offer a place, you will not be considered for a school place at an alternative school until places have been identified for other parents.

It is unlikely that you will not get any of your three preferences but nevertheless this has happened for a very small number of families in recent years. There is no advantage in listing fewer than three schools or including the same school more than once. This does not increase your chances of admission to a particular school. In fact, you are wasting one or more of your preferences and are more likely to be offered a place at a school some distance away from your home.

Information about the number of applications received and the number of places allocated at infant and primary schools last year is available within each school's information pages. Please be aware, however, that this does change from year to year, and just because a school has been undersubscribed one year does not mean that it will be the next year.

Is the admissions policy for each school important?

Yes. Deciding which school to give as your first preference is not just about which school you would prefer your child to attend. You also need to consider your chances of being offered a place at that school. This is very important if you are considering naming popular schools as your preferences and these are not your catchment school.

You should check the admissions policy for the schools you are considering to see what level of priority you would have.

If a school has been consistently oversubscribed in the past and you would have a low priority under the oversubscription criteria, you should think seriously about whether you want to apply for this school. Think carefully about naming popular schools for all three preferences, particularly if you have a low priority under the admissions policy. Other applicants that rank more highly using the school's admissions policy may be allocated all the available places.

How could this affect me?

If you don't get a place at any of your preferred schools and these do not include your catchment school, you may then be disadvantaged in getting a place at your catchment school. All the places may already have been allocated to children whose parents have named the school as a preference.

What are catchment areas?

The Local Authority's Admissions Policy for community and voluntary controlled schools and the admissions policies for many voluntary aided and foundation schools and academies make reference to catchment areas. A catchment area is a defined geographical area, which gives priority for admission to families who live within its boundary. Catchment areas defined by the Local Authority are also used in deciding on school transport entitlement. In some limited cases, foundation and voluntary aided schools and academies have a different catchment area defined for admission purposes from that which the Local Authority has defined for transport purposes. If you have any queries regarding this, please contact the School Admissions and Appeals Team.

Where an area does not form part of a catchment area the "catchment" school will be the nearest school, measuring the shortest walking route by road using the Local Authority GIS mapping system.

How do I find out which is my catchment school?

You can check with the School Admissions and Appeals Team by telephone or email. You can also ask for a map of the catchment area (for academies, voluntary aided, foundation and free schools, you will need to contact the school directly), children from your area may be attending a school which is not the catchment school. **You should not make assumptions** so it is advisable to check with the School Admissions and Appeals Team.

Do I need to send anything with my application?

You should check with the schools you are intending to state as a preference, to see whether any supporting evidence should be sent with your application or a supplementary form completed. For example, it may be that the policy gives priority to families of a particular faith and asks for evidence of this. **If you do not send the evidence this may affect the priority your child is given in the process.** Make sure that any supporting evidence or supplementary forms are submitted by the closing date of 15 January 2023.

What do I need to do if my child was previously looked after by a Local Authority?

If you are applying for a foundation or voluntary aided school, or an academy or free school and you want your application to be considered on the basis that they were previously looked after, please contact the school to find out what evidence you will need to provide. Information about what to do if you are applying for a community or voluntary controlled school can be found on page 13.

Is school transport something I should consider?

Yes. The transport policy is explained on page 151 under 'Home to school transport'. If home to school transport is a factor in deciding on your preferred schools, you should give this very careful consideration.

What happens to applications received after the closing date?

It is vital to get your application in on time. There is less chance of getting a place at your preferred school if your application is late.

At the initial offer stage of the admissions process, we do not consider applications which are either submitted or changed after the closing date of 15 January 2023 until we have dealt with all applications received on time, unless there are exceptional reasons that prevented you from submitting the form on time and you provide independent proof to confirm your circumstances. We will deal with these applications differently depending on the date we receive them.

If you submit an application after 15 January 2023 but before 10 February 2023 and you feel there are exceptional reasons for this, you must explain them when you submit it.

We may write to you and ask for more details, for example to request some independent evidence. If you cannot provide the information required, or it is not received until after 10 February 2023, we will not be able to take into account your circumstances during the initial allocation process. However, we will be able to use it at a later stage, such as reallocation day. More information about reallocation day can be found on pages 11 and 12.

If you have plans which mean you may not need a school place, you should apply anyway and withdraw your application when your plans are confirmed.

Even if there are exceptional reasons for a late application or a change of preference, it will not be possible to consider any applications received after 10 February 2023 until after places have been allocated. If your application is late (i.e. received after 15 January 2023) and is not considered as exceptional (as above), your application will not be dealt with until after the initial allocation of places. Your application will be dealt with after reallocation day (11 May 2023) and we will not inform you of the outcome of your application until the end of May 2023. If your application is late and any of the schools you express a preference for are oversubscribed from the applications that we received on time, it is highly unlikely that you will be offered a place at those schools. This will be the case even if you live in the catchment area and/or have older children already attending the school.

What happens if I move house?

If you are planning to move house, you must still make an application by the closing date of 15 January 2023, even though you may need to ask to change your preferences later because of your change of address.

If you move house after applying you must notify us. It is your responsibility to make sure you do this – if you do not it could affect the offer of a place at one of your preferred schools.

If we offer you a place at an oversubscribed school on the basis of an address you moved away from before places were allocated, we may withdraw it. If you move house after a place was allocated but before the start of the autumn term and we have reason to believe that your intended move was planned before places were allocated, we may withdraw the offer of a place.

How do I apply from outside Cumbria?

If you live outside Cumbria, you must make your application for a school place on the application form for the Local Authority where you live. You should contact the Local Authority for your area and ask for their information pack and application form.

How do I apply to another Local Authority?

One or more of the schools you apply for could be in the area of a neighbouring Local Authority. If your home address is in Cumbria, you should name your preferred schools on form your application in exactly the same way as a Cumbrian school. School Admissions will then work with the relevant Local Authority regarding your application. If you live near the Cumbrian border you may want to contact a neighbouring Local Authority for information about its schools. Details of neighbouring Authorities are provided on page 155. If you give a school in the area of a neighbouring Local Authority as your first preference and it can be offered, you would not be offered a Cumbrian school. If it cannot be offered, you would be considered for your alternative preferences.

What happens if both parents/carers cannot agree about where they would like their child to go to school?

Sometimes, separated parents or carers submit separate application forms for their children naming different preference schools. We are unable to process both applications, because the law says that only one offer per child can be made. It would not be appropriate for the School Admissions and Appeals Team to become involved in these situations. If we receive applications in these circumstances we will write to both applicants to explain the situation.

It is best if parents/carers can resolve issues between themselves and inform us, in writing, which application should be used. However, we do know that sometimes agreement cannot be reached and the School Admissions and Appeals Team then need to make a decision as to which form to use. When this happens we will try to establish the child's permanent address, using the address of the parent/ carer who claims child benefit and process that parent/ carer's application. If child benefit is not being claimed other legal documentation may be required.

As with all applications, the School Admissions and Appeals Team will only discuss the content or progress of any application with the applicant themselves.

What can I do if I am not happy with the school that I am offered?

Usually your child will be offered a place at one of your preferred schools. Last year over 100% of applicants for an infant or primary school place in Cumbria were offered one of their three preferences. If you are not offered a place in your preferred school or if you are unhappy with the school place allocated for whatever reason, you have the right of appeal to an independent admission appeal panel. Information about admission appeals can be found on page 152.

What happens if my child doesn't get a place and then one becomes available?

If you have not been offered a place at one of your preferred schools on 17 April 2023, because the school was oversubscribed, your child will be considered for any places which become available. The Local Authority will reallocate any available places after 11 May 2023. This is known as **reallocation day**. All outstanding applications will be considered, including any late ones, using the school's oversubscription criteria to prioritise.

Can my child's name go on a waiting list?

After reallocation day the admission authority must maintain a waiting list until at least 31 December in the academic year of admission.

For oversubscribed schools, the admission authority must maintain a waiting list for at least one term in the academic year of admission. More information about waiting lists for community and voluntary controlled schools can be found on page 14.

How do I apply for a school place at another time? (i.e. in year)

From the first day of the school term all applications received will be treated as in-year admissions.

You can contact your preferred school directly, and in most cases it will be able to deal with your request. If you are offered a place, you can arrange an admission date with the school. If your request is refused, this should be done in writing with the reason for refusal, and you will be informed of your right of appeal against this decision.

If you prefer, you can also contact the School Admissions team to make an application and for more information about admission to school.

Some schools may also refer you to the team to handle your application (i.e. community and voluntary controlled schools, where the LA is the admissions authority).

What is the infant class size limit?

There is a statutory limit on class sizes for children who are in Reception and Years 1 and 2. This is called the infant class size limit. Except in certain very limited circumstances, no infant class with one teacher may contain more than 30 pupils. In some schools, this means that the admission of one more child would mean that the school could not comply with the infant class size limit without, for example, providing an extra teacher. This is called taking 'relevant measures'.

Admissions over and above 30 per class can therefore be refused because taking relevant measures would cause prejudice to the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources.

How could this affect me?

If you are refused admission to your preferred school on infant class size grounds this will be explained to you along with your right of appeal. However, where the decision to refuse is on this basis, an appeal panel's powers to intervene are limited. The panel can only allow your appeal in very specific circumstances and you should give very careful consideration as to whether or not you should appeal. Children of UK Service Personnel (UK Armed Forces and Crown Servants

Children of UK Service Personnel (UK Armed Forces) and Crown Servants If you are a UK service personnel (UK Armed Forces) family with a confirmed posting to Cumbria, or a Crown Servant family returning from overseas to live in Cumbria, we will offer places in advance of the move provided the application is accompanied by: • An assignment order that declares a relocation date and a unit postal address or quartering area address for UK service personnel or • An official letter declaring a relocation date for crown servants. Evidence of a future address may also be required.

Information about admission to community and voluntary controlled schools

How do I find out if my preferred school is a community or voluntary controlled school?

You can find out if a school is community or voluntary controlled in the individual schools information pages.

How are places allocated at community and voluntary controlled schools?

If a community or voluntary controlled school is oversubscribed, places will be allocated using the oversubscription criteria contained in the Local Authority's Admissions Policy, detailed on pages 16 and 17.

Are children attending a school's nursery given a higher priority for admission?

No, attendance at a school's nursery is not a factor in allocating places at community and voluntary controlled schools.

What do I need to do if my child was previously looked after by a Local Authority/ or children who were previously looked after outside of England?

If your child was previously looked after, and you wish to be considered under category 1 of the Local Authority Admissions Policy on pages 15 and 16, you will need to provide some evidence with your application. If your child was adopted, this will be a copy of the Adoption Order. If your child became subject to a Residence/Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order, you will need to provide copies of these. If you are unsure of what you need to do, or whether your child can be considered under this category, please contact the School Admissions and Appeals Team.

Will younger brothers and sisters be able to go to the same school?

Siblings of children attending their catchment area school have a higher priority for admission when places are allocated at oversubscribed community and voluntary controlled schools. If you choose a school other than your catchment area school, places may not be available for your younger children as catchment children will have higher priority.

Which address will be used in determining my child's priority for admission?

If a school is oversubscribed, the address where the child normally lives will be used in the allocation process. It is not possible to use an alternative address such as the address of your child's grandparents or child minder. In some cases, for example where shared parental living arrangements are in place, the address where a child normally lives may be difficult to decide. In these circumstances, the address used for child benefit purposes, (i.e. the address for the parent claiming the child benefit) will be used. Residency at a particular address is a key factor in allocating places at oversubscribed schools. If we offer a school place and then discover that the offer was made on the basis of fraudulent or misleading information (for example, a false claim to be living at an address), we may withdraw the place.

What happens if I am moving house?

If you are about to move house or think you may do so in the near future, **you must contact us and tell us the address that you will be moving to**. For your application to be considered on the basis of your new address you will need to be able to provide evidence of your move as soon possible – stating an intention to move to an area will not be enough. Examples of evidence we will request are signed tenancy agreements, evidence of exchange of contracts relating to a purchase and HM Land Registry certificates. Whatever evidence you provide, we will need to be satisfied that you will be resident at this new address at the time you receive your offer a place and also at the point that your child takes up this place, in September 2023. We may have to ask you for further evidence such as utility bills. If you cannot provide the evidence required, or we do not feel that your evidence is sufficient, or it is not received until after 10 February 2023 then we will not be able to consider you for a school place based on your new address during the initial allocation process. However, we may be able to use it at a later stage (for example, on reallocation day).

A temporary move (for example, to stay with family) would not normally be considered, as the Local Authority would have to be satisfied that there is a long-term intention to remain at a particular address.

You should always keep the School Admissions and Appeals Team informed of the progress with your move.

This is your responsibility; it could affect the offer of a place at one of your preferred schools.

What happens if I provide false information?

Unfortunately, a small number of parents each year try to secure a place for their child by either providing false information or withholding relevant information on residency. Every place secured on the basis of false information potentially deprives another child of their rightful place, and the Local Authority takes allegations of falsified addresses very seriously.

All allegations will be investigated. Offers made on the basis of false or misleading information will be withdrawn, as they have been in previous years. The Local Authority will, as necessary, seek independent verification of your child's address, or of any other information provided on the application form. Local Authority officers may visit the address given as the child's residence in order to verify that he/she lives at that address.

This process may happen before or after places have been allocated.

Can my child's name go on a waiting list if they are not offered a place?

If your child does not get a place in the main allocation or reallocation process detailed on page 10, they will continue to be considered for any places which may become available until the end of the Autumn term 2023. If you still want your child to be considered for any vacancies in community or voluntary controlled schools from the start of the spring term onwards (i.e. from 3 January 2024), you should contact the School Admissions and Appeals Team to put your child's name on a waiting list.

From 3 January 2024, only children on the waiting list will be considered. Vacancies will always be allocated by applying the Admissions Policy. Length of time on the waiting list will not be a factor.

Infant and primary schools in Cumbria

The government has enacted legislation to provide for maintained schools to become academies. This may mean that by 1 September 2023 some of the maintained schools detailed in this book will become academies.

Cumbria Children's Services General Admissions Policy 2023/2024 **Community and Voluntary Controlled Schools**

Where there are more applications than places available at a community or voluntary controlled school for entry to all year groups except Year 12, applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with explanatory notes 1 - 7 which form part of the policy.

- Children looked after, i.e. in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren); children who were previously looked after; and children who were previously looked after outside of England - see note 1.
- 2. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) at the time of admission see notes 2, 3 and 4.
- 3. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) who were allocated a place at that school by the Local Authority either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified by the Local Authority as the next nearest with a place available or (b) the school is named in the sibling's Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) see notes 2, 3 and 5.
- 4. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by a straight-line measurement between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority see notes 6 and 7.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) at the time of their admission see notes 2, 3 and 4.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by a straight-line measurement between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority see notes 6 and 7.

Applications will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made under the Local Authority's policy for the education of children with special educational needs where a child holds an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), that names the school.

Explanatory notes

These notes are part of the policy.

<u>Note 1</u>

A child looked after is a child in public care, who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989. Children previously looked after are children who were looked after, but have ceased to be so because they were adopted (under the terms of the Adoption and Children Act 2002) or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order (Children Act 1989).

Advice issued by the Department for Education (DfE) in July 2021 states that a child previously looked after outside of England is one that was looked after, outside England, by a public authority, a religious organisation or another provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society.

For a previously looked after child to be considered under criteria 1, the parent or carer must provide appropriate written evidence to support the application. Without this evidence it will not be possible to consider the application under category 1 of the LA General Admissions Policy.

Note 2

In criteria 2, 3 and 5, priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children. Priority will only be given where it is known at the time of allocating places that a sibling will be attending the school (excluding a nursery class – see note 4) at the time of admission.

Note 3

Where reference is made to 'associated' infant and junior schools this is to describe those situations where infant and junior schools share the same catchment area.

Note 4

Brothers and sisters in the school at the time of admission does not include a brother or sister who will be attending a nursery class that is attached to the school.

Note 5

If a parent or carer believes that they qualify for consideration under criterion 3, they should indicate this on their preference form in the place provided for this purpose.

Note 6

Distance measurements will be undertaken using the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System [GIS]. This measures a straight-line measurement between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority.

Note 7

Random allocation will be used as a tie-break in categories 4 and 6 to decide who has the highest priority for admission if the distance between the children's home address and the school is the same. This process will be independently verified.

Where there are more applications than places available at The Alston Moor Federation's Schools, applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with explanatory notes 1 - 4 which form part of the policy. The Alston Moor Federation's Schools will maintain a waiting list for at least one term in the academic year of admission. This will be done when the school admissions number is oversubscribed and will be ranked in the same order using the criteria below.

- 1. Children looked after/subject to a child arrangements order, ie in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren) see note 1 overleaf.
- 2. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission
- 3. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by the shortest walking route by road see note 4 overleaf.
- 4. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school who were directed to that school by the Local Authority either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified by the Local Authority as the next nearest with a place available or (b) in their Education, Health and Care Plan see notes 2, 3 and 4 overleaf.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission.

Where more applications are received than the number of places, then the school will rank applications in accordance with the following oversubscription criteria, in order:

(1) Children who are looked after or are previously looked after child.

(2) Children resident within the school catchment area who have a sibling who attends the school at the date of admission.

(3) Children whose home address is within the catchment area of the school. A link to the catchment area is available on the school's website.

(4) Children of staff of the school who have been employed for two or more years at the time of the application or are recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage. Staff contracted in to provide services to the school do not count as 'direct employees'. For the purposes of this criterion, 'children of staff' is taken to include a son, daughter or step-son/daughter, or child who is adopted or fostered or for whom a special guardianship order is in place, in all cases providing they are living at the same address as the parent who is employed by the school.

(5) Children living outside of the catchment area who have a sibling attending the school at the time of admission.

6) Children who attended Arlecdon Primary School Nursery.

(7) Other children living outside of the catchment area.

School Admissions Policy 2023

All children will be admitted unless there are more applicants than places in which case the Governors will make allocations using the following criteria. These are listed in order of priority.

- 1. Children who are in Public Care or who have been adopted but were formerly in Public Care. This also includes children who were previously in Public Care outside of England. A child in public care is defined as a child who is looked after by the Local Authority within the meaning of section 22 of the Children's Act 1989.
- 2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by travelling to another school. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the Governors to consider admission in this category.
- 3. Children living within the catchment area having a brother or sister attending our school at the time of their admission giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.
- 4. Children living in the catchment area.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school.)
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area. A map of the ctachment area is available on the school webiste for parents to view.

The criteria outlined above will be strictly followed there being two exceptions:

- 1. All children whose Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) names Arnside National CE School must be admitted.
- 2. If a child has a statement of Special Educational Needs naming Arnside National CE School, then irrespective of the criteria the child will be admitted as in these circumstances the Governors have a statutory duty to admit the childconcerned.

Note 4 In criteria 2 and 3, priority will be given to those with the youngest siblings (Note 2) unless applicants have siblings which are in the same year group, then priority will be prioritised using the distance measurement methodology set out at Note 3.

Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) who were allocated a place at that school either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified as the next nearest with a place available or (b) the school is named in the sibling's Statement of Special Educational Need/ Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) see notes 2, 3 and 4.
- 4. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) at the time of their admission see notes 2 and 3.

6. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.

Applications will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made under the Authority's policy for the education of children with special educational needs where a child holds an Education, Health and Care Plan, that names the school.

Note 1 - A child looked after is a child in public care, who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989. Children previously looked after are children who were looked after, but have ceased to be so because they were adopted (under the terms of the Adoption and Children Act 2002) or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order (Children Act 1989).

The provision to give the highest priority to looked after and previously looked after children applies to all children who have been adopted from local authority care.

Note 2 - In criteria 2, 3 and 5, priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children. Where there are more applications than places available at the School for entry to all year groups, applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with the explanatory notes which form part of the policy.

- 1. A Looked After Child i.e. a child in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren) and children who were previously looked after see note 1.
- 2. Children of staff see note 2.
- 3. Children who have siblings at the School when the Admissions forms are submitted see note 3.

If there are more children with siblings at School when the admission forms are submitted than places, the places will be allocated on the basis of a straight-line measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and the main gate of the School (the gate on Rating Lane) – see note 5.

- 4. Children attending Chetwynde Kindergarten see note 4.
- 5. Children living closest to the main gate of the School, measured by a straight-line measure from the centre of the pupil's home address see note 5.

Where places are available for some but not all children from multiple births (including twins), the School will exercise discretion offered by the Admissions Code to offer all the children places.

Application will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made to this Policy where (i) a child holds a Statement of Educational Needs and/or Education, Health and Care Plan naming Chetwynde, or (ii) is currently undergoing a Statutory Assessment, and in either case it is considered that attendance at the School is necessary to meet the identified needs of that child.

Note 1 - "A Looked After Child". A looked after child is a child who:- (a) is in the care of the Local Authority, or (b) is being provided with accommodation by the Local Authority in the exercise of their Social Services function, or (c) the definition as set out in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989 and previously looked after children and children who are looked after, but cease to be so because they are adopted or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order, at the time of making an application to the School.

Note 2 - Children of staff are where a member of staff has been employed for at least 2 years at the time when the application is made, OR where a member of staff has been recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a clear skills shortage. **Note 3** - Children are siblings if they are step-siblings, adopted or foster brothers or sisters living in the same family unit at the time when the child's application form is submitted.

Note 4 - Distance measurements will be undertaken using the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System [GIS]. This measures a straight-line measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and the main gate of the School (the gate on Rating Lane). In the event of a tie break within a block of flats, those living closest from the communal entrance will be given priority.

All children will be admitted unless there are more applicants than places in which case the Governors will make allocations using the following criteria. These are listed in order of priority.

1. Children who are in Public Care. A child in public care is defined as a child who is looked after by the Local Authority within the meaning of section 22 of the Children's Act 1989. This includes previously Looked After Children and extends to children who have been adopted or who have become subject to a child arrangements or special Guardianship order A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order including those who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).

- 1. Looked After Children Previously Looked After Children and Internationally Adopted Looked After Children. Looked After, Previously Looked After and Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Children. A "Looked After Child" is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school. A "Previously Looked After Child" (PLAC) is a child who was looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a child arrangement order or special guardianship order immediately following having been looked after. Looked After and Previously Looked After Children - "Looked after children" are children who are (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school.

"Previously looked after children" are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order). Further references to "previously looked after children" means such children who were adopted (or subject to child arrangements orders or special guardianship orders) immediately following having been looked after. "Previously looked after children" includes children who were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children's Act 2002.

Child arrangements orders are defined in the Children Act 1989, as amended by the Children and Families Act 2014. Child arrangements orders replace residence orders and any residence order in force prior to 22 April 2014 is deemed to be a child arrangements order. The Children Act 1989 defines a 'special guardianship order' as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian (or special guardians).

Nursery - If you have a child in our Nursery School/Class then you must make a separate application for the Reception Class. A place in our Nursery School/Class does not guarantee a place in our Reception Class.

Multiple Births - The Governors of Eaglesfield Paddle Church of England Primary Academy will ensure as far as possible that twins, triplets, or those children born in the same year, are not separated. Such children will be given priority in any particular category.

Limited Exceptional Circumstances - While no infant class is to contain more than 30 pupils there can be very limited exceptional circumstances. The admittance of such a child/children will be known as an "excepted pupil" for the time they are in an infant class or until the numbers fall back to the size limit. The definition of an "excepted pupil" is defined in section 2.15 of the Department for Education's School Admission's Code.

Children of UK Service Personnel Children of UK service personnel will be admitted on an In Year Admissions Basis when needed.

In the event of there being more applicants than available places, the governors (or an admissions committee established by the governing body) shall, if necessary use the following criteria for selection, listed in order of priority:

(i) Looked after children or previously looked after children.

A looked after child is a child who is in the care of a LA or provided accommodation by that authority - as defined in Section 22 of the Children Act 1989 or was previously looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted.

(ii) Children who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission.

Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted, foster children and unrelated children living together as part of one household.

- (iii) Where a member of staff has been employed within the MAT for two years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made and/or the member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is demonstrable shortage.
- (iv) Other children: Giving priority to those living closest to the school measured by the shortest distance in a straight line using GIS mapping system operated by the LA to measure the distance. The straight-line measure will be taken between the centre of the pupil's home address and the main entrance at Key Stage 1 to the school building. Where the distance is the same for more than one child a random allocation tie-breaker will be applied. The tie-breaker will be the drawing of lots supervised by a person independent of the school.

When a child lives at more than one address (e.g. spends part of each week at different addresses) the home address will be decided by using the child benefit address or GP records.

The criteria outlined above will be strictly followed with there being one exception. If a child holds an Education, Health and Care plan naming Fairfield Primary School then, irrespective of the criteria, the child will be admitted as in these circumstances the Governors have a statutory duty to admit the child concerned.

All children will be admitted unless there are more applicants than places in which case the Governors will make allocations using the following criteria. These are listed in order of priority.

1. Children who are in Public Care or who have been adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order) but were formerly in Public Care. This also includes children who were previously in Public Care outside of England. A child in public care is defined as a child who is looked after by the Local Authority within the meaning of section 22 of the Children's Act 1989.

2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by travelling to another school. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the Governors to consider admission in this category.

3. Children living within the catchment area having a brother or sister attending our school at the time of their admission giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.

4. Children living in the catchment area

5. - Children looked after by the Local Authority, giving priority if necessary to the youngest children a child looked after, i.e in public care, is defined in the code as a child who is looked after by a local authority and previously looked after children which extends to children who have been adopted or have become subject to a child arrangements or special guardianship order within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989.
- 2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by travelling to another school. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the governors to consider admission on this category.

- 3. Children resident within the catchment area who already have brothers or sisters at the school at the time of their admission. If there is greater demand for places, than places available, priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers & sisters are those living at the same address & includes step children & foster children. Priority will only be given where it is known at the time of allocating places that a sibling will be attending the school at the time of admission.

Places will be offered firstly to Looked After Children i.e. children who are looked after by a public authority and are in public care, and previously looked after children who were adopted, or subject to a residence order, or special guardianship order, immediately following having been looked after.

Children with Statements of Special Educational Needs SEN or Education Health Care (EHC) Plan naming the school will also be admitted.

In the event of over-subscription, the following criteria will apply:

- Where the child lives in the school's catchment area, as defined by the catchment area map, and have a brother or sister (sibling) attending the school at the time of application;
- · Applications from within the school's catchment area;

Places will be offered firstly to Looked After Children i.e. children who are looked after by a public authority and are in public care, and previously looked after children who were adopted, or subject to a residence order, or special guardianship order, immediately following having been looked after.

Children with Statements of Special Educational Needs SEN or Education Health Care (EHC) Plan naming the school will also be admitted.

In the event of over-subscription, the following criteria will apply:

- Where the child lives in the school's catchment area, as defined by the catchment area map, and have a brother or sister (sibling) attending the school at the time of application;
- Applications from within the school's catchment area;
- Where a child lives outside the catchment area and has a brother or sister in the school;
- Where a child attends Longtown Primary School nursery; children of staff members working at a Trust school; children from outside the catchment area.

In the event of oversubscription in any category above, priority will be determined by the proximity of the child's home to Longtown Primary School using the shortest walking distance by road from the main entrance of Longtown Primary School to the main door of the residence, with those living nearest being given priority. The child's home address is defined as the child's permanent residence. In situations where a child spends equal time between two addresses, the permanent address is defined as the address at which the child is registered with a GP.

Where there are more applications than places available for entry to all year groups applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with explanatory notes 1 - 6 which form part of the policy.

1. Children looked after and who were previously looked after, i.e. in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren). See Note 1

- 2. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant/first or junior/middle school) at the time of admission. See notes 2 and 3.
- 3. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) who were allocated a place at that school either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified as the next nearest with a place available or (b) the school is named in the sibling's Statement of Special Educational Need/ Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) see notes 2, 3 and 4.
- 4. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) at the time of their admission see notes 2 and 3.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.

Applications will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made under the Authority's policy for the education of children with special educational needs where a child holds an Education, Health and Care Plan, that names the school.

Note 1 - A child looked after is a child in public care, who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989. Children previously looked after are children who were looked after, but have ceased to be so because they were adopted (under the terms of the Adoption and Children Act 2002) or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order (Children Act 1989). The provision to give the highest priority to looked after and previously looked after children applies to all children who have been adopted from local authority care. Otherwise, in the event of over subscription, the following criteria will be applied to all applications, to determine priority for the 15 available spaces:

- 1. Children looked after and previously looked after (1.28 School Admissions Code), i.e. in public care
- 2. Children from within the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission, priority being given to those with the youngest siblings.
- 3. Other children from within the catchment area, giving priority to those living closest to the school measured by the shortest walking route by road between the main school gate and their home.

All children will be admitted unless there are more applicants than places in which case the Governors will make allocations using the following criteria. These are listed in order of priority.

- 1. Children who are in Public Care or who have been adopted or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order. This also includes children who were previously in Public Care outside of England. A child in public care is defined as a child who is looked after by the Local Authority within the meaning of section 22 of the Children's Act 1989.
- 2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by travelling to another school. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the Governors to consider admission in this category.
- 3. Children living within the catchment area having a brother or sister attending our school at the time of their admission giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.
- 4. Children living in the catchment area
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area.

A copy of the catchment area can be seen on the school website or the school office that indicates the geographical and/or ecclesiastical boundary of Morland Area C. of E. Primary School.

The criteria outlined above will be strictly followed there being one exception. If a child has an Education, Health and Care Plan naming Morland Area Church of England Voluntary Aided Primary School then irrespective of the criteria the child will be admitted as in these circumstances the Governors have a statutory duty to admit the child concerned.

Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school who were directed to that school by the Local Authority either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified by the Local Authority as the next nearest with a place available or (b) in their Education, Health and Care Plan - see notes 2, 3 and 4 overleaf.

5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission.

6. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by the shortest walking route by road - see note 4 overleaf.

A copy of the catchment area map can be obtained from the school.

Applications will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made under the Authority's policy for the education of children with special needs (i) where a child holds an Education, Health and Care Plan, or (ii) is currently undergoing a statutory assessment, and in either case it is considered that attendance at a particular school is necessary to meet the identified needs of that child.

Note 1 - A child looked after/subject to a child arrangements order, i.e., in public care, is defined as a child who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989.

Note 2 - To prioritise in criteria 2, 3 and 6, priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings.Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children. In circumstances where there is an application for more than one child in the family, and it is not possible to offer a place to all of the children concerned, it will be up to the parents/carers to decide whether they wish to accept the place[s] offered. Note 3 - If parents/carers believe they qualify for consideration under criterion 3, they should indicate this on their preference form in the place provided for this purpose. In relation to a child with an Educational, Health and Care Plan, the Educational, Health and Care Plan must state that the child is directed by the Local Authority to attend a particular school which is necessary to meet his or her identified needs. We welcome all children to our caring school family regardless of background or beliefs so all will be admitted unless there are more applicants than places. In which case the Governors will make allocations using the following criteria. These are listed in order of priority:

1. Children who are in Public Care

a. "Looked After Children" A 'looked after child' is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school.

b. Previously "Looked After Children". This includes children who have been adopted or have become subject to a residence or special guardianship. (Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order). Further references to previously looked after children in this Code means such children who were adopted (or subject to child arrangements orders or special guardianship order) immediately following having been looked after. Previously looked after children includes children who were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children's Act 2002. Child arrangements orders are defined in the Children Act 1989, as amended by the Children and Families Act 2014. Child arrangements order. The Children Act 1989 defines a 'special guardianship order' as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian.

- 2. Children living within the catchment area having a brother or sister attending our school at the time of their admission giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.
- 3. Children living within the catchment area.
- 4. Children living outside the catchment area having brothers and sisters attending our School at the time of their admission giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.
- 5. Children who have attended Nursery on our site, for at least one full term.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area.

The criteria outlined above will be strictly followed there being one exception. If a child has an Education, Health and Care Plan, naming Orton Church of England Aided School then irrespective of the criteria the child will be admitted as in these circumstances the Governors have a statutory duty to admit the child concerned.

Tie Break - In some categories, where there are more applicants than places available, age may act as a determining factor but unless specified it will be distance. The distance is measured from the centre of the pupil's home address to the main pedestrian entrance gate of the school. In the case of a farm this will be from the centre of the house to the main pedestrian gate of the school. The distance is determined by the shortest walking route by road. The Governors will use the Local Authority measuring system to ensure consistency of measurement. The closest addresses will have priority.

Address of Pupil - The address on the application form must be the current one at the time of application. Where a child can live at more than one address the home address is to be the one where the child sleeps and thus wakes up for all or the majority of the school week. Where there is any doubt the governors reserve the right to verify the information provided by the parent(s), for example, through the GP or the child benefit address.

Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and include step, foster and adopted children. Priority will only be given where it is known at the time of allocating places that a sibling will be attending the school at the time of admission.

In the event that there are more applicants than places, the Academy Trust will allocate places using the following criteria, which are listed in order of priority:

- 1. Children looked after by a local authority and previously looked after children. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order).
- 2. Attendance at Seaton Academy Nursery.
- 3. Children resident within the Academy catchment area who have a brother or sister already in attendance at Seaton Academy at the time of admission.
- 4. Children resident within the Academy catchment area.
- 5. Children not resident in the catchment area with a brother or sister already in attendance at Seaton Academy at the time of admission. (Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children.)

6. Children not resident in the Academy catchment area without a brother and sister already in attendance at Seaton Academy. If applications cannot be separated by applying the above criteria, places will be prioritised by the proximity of the front door of the child's home to the Main Entrance of the Academy, measured by a straight line, those nearest being awarded the highest priority.

Notes

All children will be admitted unless there are more applicants than places in which case the Governors will make allocations using the following criteria. These are listed in order of priority.

- A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order91 including those who appear [to the admission authority] to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989)
- 2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by travelling to another school. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the Governors to consider admission in this category.
- 3. Children with a sibling attending the school at the time of application. Sibling is defined in these arrangements as children who live as brother or sister in the same house, including natural brothers or sisters, adopted siblings, stepbrothers or sisters and foster brothers and sisters.

In the event of more applications being received for admission than there are places available within the particular year group, the following order of priority will be applied.

Priority 1 - Looked After Children and previously looked after children (School Admissions Code 1.28a). A child looked after, i.e. in public care, is defined in the new School Admission Code as a child who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children's Act 1989. Previously looked after children are children who are looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).

Priority 2 - Baptised Catholic children living in the parishes of St Bede's and St Edmund's who will have, on the date of admission, a sibling attending the school. This includes full brothers and sisters, half brothers and sisters and step brothers and sisters. Proof of Baptism will be required.

Priority 3 - Baptised Catholic children within the parishes of St Bede's and St Edmund's. Proof of Baptism will be required.

Priority 4 - Baptised Catholic children living outside the parishes of St Bede's and St Edmund's who will have, on the date of admission, a sibling in the school. Proof of Baptism will be required.

Priority 5 - Baptised Catholic children living outside the parishes of St Bede's and St Edmund's. Proof of Baptism will be required.

Priority 6 - Non-Catholic children who will on the date of admission have a sibling in the school.

Looked After Children, Previously Looked After Children and Internationally Adopted Looked After Children (LAC, PLAC and IAPLAC)

1. The first oversubscription criterion must always be Looked After, Previously Looked After and Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Children. As this is a legal requirement, it automatically appears as the first of the school's oversubscription criteria. A "Looked After Child" (LAC) s a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school.

A "Previously Looked After Child" (PLAC) is a child who was looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order immediately following having been looked after.

An "Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Child (IAPLAC) is a child who appears (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

Social and Medical need

2. Priority will be given in exceptional circumstances to a small number of children (or in some cases a close relative of the child) whose mental or physical impairment means they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend this school over any other. Supporting evidence in the form of a letter from a doctor or social worker or other relevant qualified, independent professional, would be required. Medical, health, social and special access reasons will be applied in accordance with the school's legal obligations and does not guarantee that a child will be given priority as each decision will be made on the merits of the individual case.

Pupil Premium

3. Children eligible for the pupil premium including the Early Years pupil premium and the service premium. Parents/ guardians will be required to provide evidence of eligibility and the school may request confirmation from the applicant's home local authority. Children given priority under this criterion fall into the following categories:

- Children eligible to be registered for free school meals and children who have been registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last six years;
- Children eligible to receive the Early Years premium; and
- Children whose parent(s) are serving in the regular UK armed forces, the children of regular armed forces personnel who were serving in the past 3 years, or children who are in receipt of a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme and the War Pensions Scheme because their parent(s) died on active service with the UK armed forces.

Siblings

4. Siblings of pupils attending the school during the academic year to which the child would be admitted. 'Sibling' means a natural brother or sister, a half brother or sister, a legally adopted brother or sister or half-brother or sister, a step brother or sister, or other child living in the same household who, in any of these cases, will be living with them at the same address at the date of their entry to the school.

Catchment area

5. Children living in the catchment area of the school.

Tie-breaker

Proximity to the school. This will be measured by the shortest walking distance by road or maintained footpath or other public rights of way from the pupil's home, to the main entrance point of the school using a GIS computerised mapping system.

In the event that two or more children live at the same distance from the school (as can happen with families living in blocks of flats), random allocation, where supervised drawing of lots by an independent responsible person of good standing will be used to decide which child(ren) will be allocated the remaining place(s) (in accordance with 1.34 and 1.35 of the School Admissions Code).

School Admissions Policy 2023

The Governors will admit up to 30 children per class in September 2023. If the number of applications for admission exceeds the places available, children will be admitted subject to the following criteria which will be used to form a priority order.

a. Children who are baptised Catholics or who have been received into the Catholic Church* and are looked after children or immediately after such status became subject to an adoption, residence or special guardianship order.

b. Children who are baptised Catholics or who have been received into the Catholic Church* and who live within the parish of St. Mary's, Egremont.

c. Other baptised Catholic children or children who have been received into the Catholic Church*.

d. Other children who are looked after children or immediately after such status became subject to an adoption, residence or special guardianship order.

e. Children who are baptised in or members of other Christian Churches*.

f. Other children.

*Evidence of baptism or church membership must be provided and the attached Supplementary Information Form completed. Acceptable evidence is baptism certificate or note from priest/vicar etc.

Each of the criteria is to be regulated by the following principles which, acting as tie-breaking norms, indicate who is to be preferred for admission within each category of criteria. In order of preference these are:

a. Siblings of children who will attend St. Bridget's School at the time of admission.

b. Children of staff who have been employed at St. Bridget's School for two or more years or who have been recruited to meet the school's particular skills shortage.

c. Applicants living nearest to the school. The distance measured will be the shortest walking route from the centre of the pupil's home to the nearest entrance on the school site which is available to pupils at the time of undertaking the assessment. Distance measurements will be undertaken (using the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System).

Baptised Catholic

Please note this is not a change in our admission policy, it is a definition for the purpose of clarification. For admission to this Catholic school a baptised Catholic is:

- One who has been baptised into full communion with the Roman Catholic Church by the Rites of Baptism of one of the various ritual Churches in communion with the See of Rome (Proof of baptism with a copy of a baptismal certificate or details of the date and place of baptism will be required)
- A child baptised in another Christian Faith who has been received into full communion with the Roman Catholic faith. (Proof of baptism and reception from the Register of Receptions or Baptismal Register will be required)
- A child who, with his or her family, is enrolled in a recognised course of preparation leading to Catholic baptism (Proof of enrolment with details of the place and date of enrolment from the appropriate parish records will be required).

Looked After Children - This means a child who is looked after by a local authority in accordance with section 22 of the Children Act 1989. This is a child in public care who is in the care of a local authority or provided with accommodation by that authority. It includes children who were previously looked after but immediately after such status became subject to an adoption, residence or special guardianship order. Also included are children who were previously looked after children outside the United Kingdom.

Siblings - Sibling refers to full brothers or sisters, half brothers or sisters, adopted brothers or sisters, or the child of the parent/carer's partner where the child for whom the place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling. Stepchildren or foster children who live at the same address are also classed as siblings.

1. The first oversubscription criterion must always be Looked After, Previously Looked After and Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Children. As this is a legal requirement, it automatically appears as the first of the school's oversubscription criteria. A "Looked After Child" (LAC)s a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Chi ldren Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school. A "Previously Looked After Child" (PLAC) is a child who was looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order immediately following having been looked after.

An "Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Child (IAPLAC) is a child who appears (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

Social and Medical need

2. Priority will be given in exceptional circumstances to a small number of children {or in some cases a close relative of the child) whose mental or physical impairment means they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend this school over any other.

In the event that there are more applicants than places, the Academy Trust will allocate places using the following criteria, which are listed in order of priority:

- Children looked after by a local authority and previously looked after children. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements or special guardianship order). This includes those children previously looked after outside of England.
- 2. Children resident within the School catchment area who have a brother or sister already in attendance at Stramongate School at the time of admission.
- 3. Children resident within the School catchment area.
- 4. Children not resident in the catchment area with a brother or sister already in attendance at Stramongate School at the time of admission. (Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children.)
- 5. Children on roll at Stramongate Nursery at Stramongate School.
- 6. Children not resident in the School catchment area and without a brother or sister already in attendance at Stramongate School.

Places will be offered firstly to Looked After Children i.e children who are looked after by a public authority and are in public care, and previously looked after children who were adopted, or subject to a residence order, or a special guardianship order, immediately following having been looked after.

Children with Statements of Special Educational Needs (SEN) or Education Health Care (EHC) Plan naming the school will also be admitted.

In the event of over-subscription the following criteria will apply:-

- 1. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers and sisters in the school at the time of admission.
- 2. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school who a) have a statement of special educational need, or children who have an Educational Health Care Plan that names that school or b) were directed to the school by the LA in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified by the LA as the next nearest with a place available.
- 3. Children living in the catchment area who are attending Tebay Primary School Pre-school Nursery at the closing date for applications for a school place.
- 4. Children of staff employed by Tebay Primary School, where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two years or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made and the member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.
- 5. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by the shortest walking route by road.

- 6. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission.
- 7. Children living outside the catchment area who are attending Tebay Primary School Pre-school Nursery at the closing date for applications for a school place. 8. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by the shortest walking route by road.

In the event of oversubscription in any category, priority will be determined by the proximity of the child's home to Tebay Primary School using the shortest walking distance by the road from the main entrance of Tebay Primary School. In the event of oversubscription in any category above, priority will be determined by the proximity of the child's home to Tebay Primary School using the shortest walking distance by road from the main entrance of Tebay Primary School to the main door of the residence, with those living nearest being given priority. The child's home address is defined as the child's permanent residence. In situations where a child spends equal time between two addresses, the permanent address is defined as the address at which the child is registered with a GP.

(The distance would be determined by using a distance measuring tool – such as AA route planner or Datamap). Apartments/flats will be treated equally with the measurement taken to the main entrance of the block. If after applying the distance tie-breaker there are more applications then places available from the apartment/flat block furthest away, a further tie-breaker of Random Allocation will be used for the applications from this block. This will be overseen by someone independent of the school.

Where there are more applications than places available for entry to all year groups applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with explanatory notes 1 - 6 which form part of the policy.

- 1. Children looked after and who were previously looked after, i.e. in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren). See Note 1
- 2. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant/first or junior/middle school) at the time of admission. See notes 2 and 3.
- 3. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) who were allocated a place at that school either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified as the next nearest with a place available or (b) the school is named in the sibling's Statement of Special Educational Need/ Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) see notes 2, 3 and 4.
- 4. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) at the time of their admission see notes 2 and 3.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.

The provision to give the highest priority to looked after and previously looked after children applies to all children who have been adopted from local authority care.

Note 2

In criteria 2, 3 and 5, priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children. 1. Looked After Children, Previously Looked After Children and Internationally Adopted Looked After Children

A "Looked After Child" is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school.

A "Previously Looked After Child" (PLAC) is a child who was looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a child arrangement order or special guardianship order immediately following having been looked after.

An "Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Child" is a child who appears (to the Admission Authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

2. Social and Medical need

Priority will be given in exceptional circumstances to a small number of children (or in some cases a close relative of the child) whose mental or physical impairment means they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend this school over any other.

Supporting evidence in the form of a letter from a doctor or social worker or other relevant qualified, independent professional, would be required. Medical, health, social and special access reasons will be applied in accordance with the school's legal obligations and does not guarantee that a child will be given priority as each decision will be made on the merits of the individual case.

3. Pupil Premium

Children eligible for the pupil premium including the Early Years pupil premium and the service premium. Parents/ guardians will be required to provide evidence of eligibility and the school may request confirmation from the applicant's home local authority. Children given priority under this criterion fall into the following categories:

- Children eligible to be registered for free school meals and children who have been registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last six years;
- · Children eligible to receive the Early Years premium; and
- Children whose parent(s) are serving in the regular UK armed forces, the children of regular armed forces personnel who were serving in the past 3 years, or children who are in receipt of a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme and the War Pensions Scheme because their parent(s) died on active service with the UK armed forces.

4. Siblings

Siblings of pupils attending the school at the time of application who live within the catchment area (see Criterion 7 below for a definition of the catchment area).

"Sibling" means a natural brother or sister, a half brother or sister, a legally adopted brother or sister or half-brother or sister, a step brother or sister, or other child living in the same household who, in any of these cases, will be living with them at the same address at the date of their entry to the school.

5. Distance from school

Proximity to the school with those living closest to the school having priority calculated by those living closest to the school measured by the shortest walking route by road from the centre of the pupil's home address to the front entrance of the school.

The Governors will use the local authority's computerised Geographical Information System (GIS) to ensure consistency of measurement. The closest addresses will have priority.

The child's home address will be determined by proof of residency by a recognised formal document.

6. Catchment area

Children living in the catchment area of the school. The catchment area is identified on the map which you can view at the school office.

Tiebreaker - Proximity to the school. This will be measured by the shortest walking distance by road or maintained footpath or other public rights of way from the pupil's home to the main entrance point of the school using a GIS computerised mapping system.

In the event that two or more children live the same distance from the school (as can happen with families living in blocks of flats), random allocation, where supervised drawing of lots by an independent responsible person of good standing will be used to decide which child(ren) will be allocated the remaining place(s) (in accordance with 1.34 and 1.35 of the School Admissions Code 2021).

- 2. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission. [See note 2 below]
- 3. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school measured by the shortest walking route by road, measured from the main school gate to the home.
- 4. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of their admission. [See note 2 below]
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by the shortest walking route by road, measured from the main school gate to the home.

Note 1 - The School Admissions Code now requires highest priority to be given to looked after children and previously looked after children (para 1.7) which extends to children who have been adopted or have become subject to a child arrangements order. A child in public care is defined as a child who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989.

Note 2 - If it is necessary to prioritise in categories 2 or 4, priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and includes step and foster children.

Applications will be prioritised using the above criteria. An exception may be made if a child has an Education, Health and Care Plan naming Warwick Bridge School, as in these circumstances the Governing Body would have a statutory duty to admit the child concerned.

A map of the catchment area is available from the school or the Local Authority.

The Prioritised Criteria that School Governors use to inform Admission Decisions when over-subscription applies

- 'Looked after children' and previously looked after children. 'A looked after child' is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the excerise of their social services functions (section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangement order or special guardianship order)
- 2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by traveling to another school. Need in these cases will be defined as such and evidenced in writing by a doctor, social worker or other relevant professional qualified to assess and prioritise relative levels of need. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the Governors to consider admission in this category.
- 3. Children living within the catchment area having brothers and sisters attending our School at the time of their admission, giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address, including step- and foster-children.
- 4. Children living within the catchment area who with their parents attend on a regular basis (i.e. at least twice a month for the last 2 years) a church recognised by Churches Together in Britain. [Attendance may be at more than one church.]
- 5. Children living within the catchment area.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area having brothers and sisters attending our school at the time of their admission, giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address, including step- and foster-children.
- 7. Children living outside the catchment area who with their parents attend on a regular basis (i.e. at least twice a month for two years) a church recognised by Churches Together in Britain. [Attendance may be at more than one church.]
- 8. Children living outside the catchment area.

The criteria outlined above will be strictly followed with there being one exception. If a child has a statement of Special Educational Needs and/or an Education Health Care Plan naming Wiggonby Church of England School then, irrespective of the criteria, the child will be admitted as in these circumstances the Governors have a statutory duty to admit the child concerned.

Tie Break - In some categories, where there are more applicants than places available, age will act as a determining factor but unless specified it will be distance. The distance is measured from the child's home to the main entrance door of the School. The distance is determined by the shortest walking route by road. The Governors will use the Local Authority measuring system to ensure consistency of measurement. The closest addresses will have priority.

Where there are more applications than places available for entry to all year groups applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with explanatory notes 1 - 6 which form part of the policy.

- 1. Children looked after and who were previously looked after, i.e. in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren). See Note 1
- 2. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant/first or junior/middle school) at the time of admission. See notes 2 and 3.
- 3. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) who were allocated a place at that school either (a) in the absence of a place being available in the catchment area school due to oversubscription and the school was identified as the next nearest with a place available or (b) the school is named in the sibling's Statement of Special Educational Need/ Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) see notes 2, 3 and 4.
- 4. Other children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by a straightline measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System - see notes 5 and 6.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school (or associated infant or junior school) at the time of their admission see notes 2 and 3.
- 6. Children living outside the catchment area, giving priority to those who live closest to the school, measured by a straight-line measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System see notes 5 and 6.

Applications will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made under the Authority's policy for the education of children with special educational needs where a child holds an Education, Health and Care Plan, that names the school.

Note 1 - A child looked after is a child in public care, who is looked after by a local authority within the meaning of Section 22 of the Children Act 1989. Children previously looked after are children who were looked after, but have ceased to be so because they were adopted (under the terms of the Adoption and Children Act 2002) or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order (Children Act 1989). The provision to give the highest priority to looked after and previously looked after children applies to all children who have been adopted from local authority care. Note 2 - In criteria 2, 3 and 5, priority will be given to those children. Priority will only be given where it is known at the time of allocating places that a sibling will be attending the school (excluding a nursery class) at the time of admission. Note 3 - Where reference is made to 'associated' infant and junior schools this is to describe those situations where infant and junior schools share the same catchment area.

Note 4 - If parent or carers believe they qualify for consideration under criterion 3, they should indicate this on their preference form in the place provided for this purpose.

Note 5 - Distance measurements will be undertaken using the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System [GIS]. This measures a straight-line measure between the centre of the pupil's home address and a common point on the school site as determined by the LA.

Note 6 - Random allocation will be used as a tie-break in categories 5 and 8 to decide who has the highest priority for admission if the distance between the children's home address and the school is the same. This process will be independently verified.

Places will be offered firstly to Looked After Children i.e. children who are looked after by a public authority and are in public care, and previously looked after children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted, or became subject to a child arrangements order, or special guardianship order.
- 2. Where the child lives in the school's catchment area, as defined by the catchment area map, and have a brother or sister (sibling) attending the school at the time of application;
- 3. Applications from within the school's catchment area;

Where there are more applications than places available at Yarlside Academy applications will be prioritised using the criteria below. They will be applied in conjunction with explanatory notes 1 - 4, which form part of the policy.

- 1. Children looked after and who were previously looked after, including those previously looked after outside England i.e. in public care, giving priority, if necessary, to the youngest child(ren) see Note 1.
- 2. Children of staff employed by Yarlside Academy, on a permanent contract of 0.6 FTE or above for two or more years, at the time when their application for a school place is made or a staff member who has been recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a skill shortage.
- 3. Children living in the catchment area who have brothers or sisters in the school at the time of admission see Note 2.
- 4. Children living in the catchment area giving priority to those living closest to the school, measured by a straight line between the centre of the pupil's home address and the school's main front entrance see Note 3.
- 5. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school see Note 2.

Note 2 - In criteria 3 priority will be given to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address and include step, foster and adopted children or other children living at the same address. Priority will only be given where it is known at the time of allocating places that a sibling will be attending the school [excluding a nursery class] at the time of admission.

Note 3 - In criteria 4 and 6, applications will be prioritised using the distance measurement methodology set out at as follows. Distance measurements will be undertaken using the LA's GIS. This measures a straight-line between the centre of the pupil's home address and the main entrance to the school building as determined by the Headteacher at the time the application was made.

Note 4 - In criteria 5, priority will be given to those with the youngest siblings (Note 2) unless applicants have siblings which are in the same year group, then priority will be prioritised using the distance measurement methodology set out at Note 3.

Applications will be prioritised on the above basis. An exception will be made for the education of children with special educational needs where a child holds an Education, Health and Care Plan, that names Yarlside Academy.

In the event of oversubscription, the following criteria will apply:

- 1. Where the child lives in the school's catchment area, as defined by the catchment area map, and have a brother or sister (sibling) attending the school at the time of application;
- 2. Applications from within the school's catchment area;
- 3. Where a child lives outside the catchment area and has a brother or sister in the school;
- 4. Where a child attends a Yewdale Nursery;
- 5. Children of staff members working at a Trust school;
- 6. Children from outside the catchment area.

In the event of oversubscription in any category above, priority will be determined by the proximity of the child's home to Yewdale Primary School using the shortest walking distance by road from the main entrance of Yewdale Primary School to the main door of the residence, with those living nearest being given priority. The child's home address is defined as the child's permanent residence. In situations where a child spends equal time between two addresses, the permanent address is defined as the address at which the child is registered with a GP.

(The distance would be determined by using a distance measuring tool - AA route planner will be used by Cumbria Education Trust). Apartments/flats will be treated equally with the measurement taken to the main entrance of the block. If after applying the distance tie-breaker there are more applications then places available from the apartment/flat block furthest away, a further tie-breaker of Random Allocation will be used for the applications from this block. This will be overseen by someone independent of the Trust.

Further help and advice

Help with Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs)

If your child has an Educational Health Care Plan the school application and placement process will be dealt with by the Special Education Needs Team for your area.

Most children with an EHCP can, with appropriate support, have their needs met in any local school. Occasionally, a child's needs are such that they can only be met at a particular school. This may, for example, be a school which has been adapted to cater for children with mobility problems. In these circumstances it is the Local Authority's responsibility to offer your child a place in a school that is best able to meet their needs. This school will be named in your child's an EHCP and your child would be given priority when allocating places.

Free school meals and school uniform grants

If you have previously received a school clothing grant and continue to be on benefits, your child's free school meals will continue also once they go into year 3. If your child is going into year 3 and you have not previously applied for free school meals or a school uniform grant, you can apply at any time so long as you are in receipt of one or more of the following qualifying benefits:

- Income Support (IS);
- Income Based Jobseekers Allowance (Not contribution based);
- An income-related Employment and Support Allowance (Not contribution related);
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999;
- Child Tax Credit, provided you are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs) that as of April 2012 does not exceed £16,190. Note: From 1st May 2009 where you are entitled to Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after your employment ceases, or after you start to work less than 16 hours per week, your children are entitled to Free School Meals, this may be extended.
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit;
- Universal credit.

Home to school transport

Local authorities must provide free home to school transport for pupils of compulsory school age who attend the nearest suitable school (In Cumbria – this means the "catchment" or nearest suitable school) and meet the following requirements:

- Who live beyond the statutory walking distance.
- Where the pupil has mobility problems and is unable to walk to and from school.
- Where the pupil cannot be expected to walk because of the nature of the route.
- For some pupils from low income families (defined as those families whose children are in receipt of free school meals or the parents/carers on the maximum level of Working Tax Credit).

The statutory walking distance is defined as two miles for a child under the age of eight years and three miles for children aged eight and over. This distance is measured along the shortest available route along which a child, accompanied by an adult if necessary, may walk in reasonable safety.

For those families whose children are of compulsory school age and are in receipt of free school meals or the parents/ carers on the maximum level of Working Tax Credit free home to school transport must be provided as follows:

- For primary age pupils aged between eight and ten years they are eligible for free transport to enable them to attend the nearest suitable school where this is more than two miles from their home.
- Secondary age pupils aged eleven to sixteen are eligible for free transport as follows:
 - to one from the three nearest schools all of which must be more than 2 miles but not more than 6 miles from their home:
 - are attending their nearest faith school preferred by parents on the basis of religion and which is greater than 2 miles but not more than 15 miles from their home.

The legislation also requires local authorities to have regard to any wish of a parent/carer to have their child educated at a particular school where that wish is based on the parent's/ carer's religion or belief.

Unless any of the above conditions applies you should not expect to receive home to school transport for your child.

Admission appeals

Who has the right of appeal?

Parents who are refused a place at their preferred school or schools are given the right of appeal to a school admission appeals panel, the panel is completely independent of the Local Authority and the school who have no say over the panel's decisions. If this happens to you, we will send you a letter that will give you further information and will explain what to do next, including the deadline for appealing (if you want your appeal to be heard along with all of the other appeals for that school) and who to contact.

Who is responsible for setting up appeals?

Individual admission authorities are responsible for making arrangements for admission appeals. For community and voluntary controlled schools, this is the Local Authority. For foundation and voluntary aided schools, free schools and academies, it is the responsibility of the governing body or academy trust. Appeals must be arranged in line with statutory requirements. In all the cases the appeals panel is completely independent of the admissions authorities who have no say over the panel's decisions.

When will my appeal be heard?

Admission authorities must give anyone who wants to appeal at least 20 school days from the date of the notification that their application was unsuccessful to submit their appeal. Appeals against decisions made in the 'normal admissions round' must then be heard within 40 school days of the deadline for submitting appeals. For applications that were made by the closing date, admission authorities will usually try to ensure that the relevant independent appeals panel considers the appeal before the end of the summer term, but there are sometimes exceptions to this. Admission authorities are required to publish their appeals timetables on their websites by 28 February each year.

Who sits on an appeals panel?

Independent admission appeal panel members are trained volunteers who are completely independent of the admission authority. The admission authority has no say over their decisions. At least one of the three panel members will have a background in education. They have the services of a clerk, who provides legal advice and takes notes at the hearing. Parents can choose to attend the hearing, or have the hearing heard in their absence if for any reason they are unable to attend.

Are there different types of appeal?

There are 2 different types of appeals for children starting school in Reception:

- Infant class size appeals; and
- Non infant class size appeals.

Infant class size appeals

You can find more information on the infant class size limit on page 12 of this booklet. You will be told if you are being refused admission on infant class size grounds. This means that an appeal panel's power to intervene is limited. The panel can only allow an appeal in very specific circumstances:

- · Where it finds that the admission of additional children would not breach the infant class size limit; or
- Where it finds that admissions arrangements were not legal or were not correctly applied, and the child would have been offered a place if they had been; or
- Where it decides that the decision to refuse admission was not one which a reasonable admission authority would have made in the circumstances of the case.

Should I appeal if my refusal was on infant class size grounds?

The threshold for finding that an admission authority's decision to refuse admission was not reasonable is high. The decision would need to have been 'perverse' or 'outrageous'. Applicants should therefore give careful consideration as to whether or not they should appeal if they have been refused on infant class size grounds.

Non-infant class size appeals

At the appeal hearing, the panel will hear information from the admission authority about why the application was refused – and then need to make a decision as to whether or not the admissions arrangements were legal and correctly applied and whether or not the school would be 'prejudiced' (i.e. disadvantaged) by the admission of another child.

If the panel does decide that the arrangements were legal and applied correctly, and that the school would be prejudiced by the admission of another child, they then hear the case of the parents. They will ask questions of the parents to try to get all the information they need to make a decision as to who would suffer the greater prejudice – the school if the child were admitted, or the child and family if they were not. This is a balancing exercise – the panels look at a wide range of factors when making their decision. If they find that the disadvantage to the child and family would be greater than that of the school, then the appeal will be successful and the child will be admitted. The admission authority has no say over the panel's decisions.

How can I challenge, or complain about, an appeals panel's decision?

A decision of an appeal panel is binding on both the parents and the admission authority. If either side is unhappy with the decision of the panel and wants it overturned they can make an application to the High Court to judicially review the decision. The High Court will only consider such an application if the decision of the panel discloses an error of law.

If a parent is unhappy with the decision of an appeal panel, they may also complain the Local Government Ombudsman (LGO) in respect of community, voluntary controlled, foundation or voluntary aided schools. The LGO has the power to investigate alleged or apparent maladministration in connection with an appeal and can make recommendations to the local authority, including that the appeal is reheard.

In respect of academies and free schools parents can complain to the Education Funding Agency (EFA), instead of the LGO. If a school coverts to an academy during the appeals process, the LGO is still able to investigate the complaint.


