

Equality and Inclusion

Britain is a diverse and multicultural country that is rich in tradition and culture. We believe that it is imperative that children at Rose Wood gain a real understanding and appreciation of others, their cultures, traditions, and ways of life. We want to equip our children with an understanding of our diverse society, and the ability to co-exist with a range of people.

The Equality Act 2010 strengthened the law, protecting people from harassment, discrimination and victimisation. The act introduced nine protected characteristics:



This duty aims to:

- eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Equality Act 2010
- advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it
- foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it

At Rose Wood, we aim to meet the three main aims of this duty by promoting equality and ensuring that children show an understanding tolerance and appreciation of our diverse society. We aim to develop a culture of inclusion and diversity in which all those connected to Rose Wood feel proud of their identity and are able to participate fully in school life. We believe that diversity is a strength, which should be respected and celebrated by all those

who learn, teach and visit here. To promote positive attitudes to difference and good relationships between people with different backgrounds, genders, cultures, faiths, abilities and ethnic origins, all staff strive to provide material that gives positive images based on race, gender, sexual orientation, transgender identity and disability, and challenges stereotypical images. All staff view dealing with incidents as vital to the well-being of the whole school.

Through our school values of 'Be Kind and REAP the Rewards' (Respect, Empathy, Achievement and Pride), promoting equality and celebrating diversity is an ethos across school. The messages are reinforced throughout our curriculum and in the daily life of school. Adults act as role models for this and children are explicitly taught how to develop and demonstrate the skills and attributes needed to be a positive member of modern Britain.







Teaching and learning about protected characteristics is fully integrated into our PSHE programme – SCARF - with age-appropriate content across the spiral curriculum. Some protected characteristics benefit from in-depth coverage that give children time to explore the knowledge and attitudes that will help them develop an appreciation of them. These lessons are shown below. Teaching and learning about the protected characteristics also threads through the vast majority of other SCARF lesson plans.







Promoting equality and the protected characteristics is also addressed through our assemblies and in our wider curriculum. For example, Year 2 undertake an enquiry driven learning unit on 'How have these powerful women changed history?' where they look at women's achievements in a range of contexts. We also include events such as 'Black History Month' and 'World Religion Day' in our SMSC calendar for further opportunities for children to develop their understanding.

Through our approach of using quality texts to stimulate and deepen learning, we use the following texts across school to encourage positive and guided discussion of the protected characteristics.
