#### Is your child safe online?

It can be difficult to know how to start talking to your child about what they're doing online or who they might be speaking to. However, talking regularly, like you would about their day at school, will help your child feel relaxed and mean that when they do have any worries, they're more likely to come and speak to you. Here are some tips:

- Reassure them that you're interested in their life, offline and online. Recognise that they'll be using the internet to research homework as well talking to their friends
- Ask your child to show you what they enjoy doing online or the apps they're using so that you understand them
- Be positive but also open about anything you're worried about. You could say "I think this site's really good" or "I'm a little worried about things I've seen here."
- Ask them if they're worried about anything, and let them know they can come to you
- Ask them about their 'friends' online and how they know they are who they say they are
- Listen to the reasons why your child wants to use apps or sites you don't think are suitable, so that you may talk about these together
- Ask your child what they think may be okay for children of different ages to access so that they feel involved in your decision making
