

Roseberry Academy Review of School Sports Premium Plan 2020-21

Vision: All children leave our academy physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Key Outcome Indicator	Review
The engagement of <i>all</i> pupils in regular physical activity- promoting healthy active lifestyles and positive mental health	This objective has been met. With the employment of a qualified sports teacher, a whole school PE curriculum plan (including children working towards national awards in athletics and gymnastics) is now in place and training for key school staff in the delivery and assessment of sport in school has raised standards in PE across the school. As a result of this, levels of pupil engagement and enjoyment have increased, especially in dance for boys. Staff are effective in supporting children with additional needs and are able to effectively differentiate lessons to ensure that <i>all</i> children are able to achieve. The Family Mentor support for specific children with SEND during PE sessions has enabled access for all.
Increasing the number of children accessing a range of after school sporting provision, ensuring a closing of the gender gap within specific sports	Due to the pandemic, an improvement in this area has been difficult to measure, as there were prolonged periods of time where after school sporting provision could not be offered. It is recognised, however, that there is still a gender gap within specific sports, ie football, and so a female coach will be deployed (noted within the 2021-22 plan) to ensure that girls have a positive role model during after school sporting activities.
The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school with the introduction of recognised awards, as a tool for whole school improvement and developing positive mental health	The provision of play equipment has encouraged children to be more active during break time Children in Year Six were unable to access swimming lessons due to restrictions linked to the pandemic. Children have taken part in a sports award scheme, with success.
To engage children in physical and risk taking activities in a safe environment	Due to the pandemic, children were unable to attend the annual residential visit to East Barnby to undertake risk taking activities. Alternative activities were arranged on school premises, although these were limited.

Continued increase in participation in competitive sport	Due to the effects of the pandemic, children were unable to take part in inter schools' sports competitions and tournaments throughout the year and so the Principal has liaised with a sports coach for this to take place in 2021-22.
All children leave at the end of KS2 being able to swim 25m unaided and have the skills to self save.	Due to lockdown, swimming lessons did not take place and so there is no data available regarding the percentage of Year Six children able to swim 25m unaided.
