Welcome back to final half of the Summer term. I do hope that you had a great half term break.

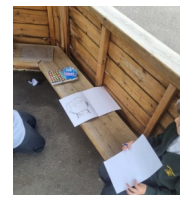
This term we are busy preparing the children for transition into their new classes and year groups.

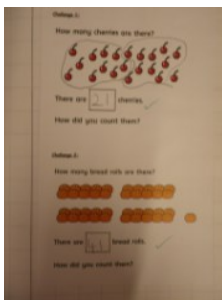

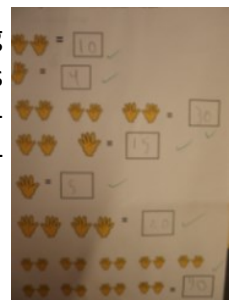

ROMANIA CLASS

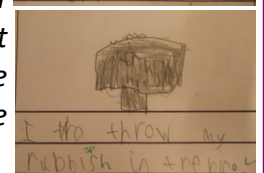
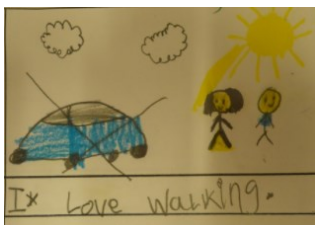


This week in maths, we have been learning to count to 100 by making 10s. We learned that grouping into 10s and counting in 10s makes counting easier, faster and more efficient. We had so much fun learning, we used concrete resources, pictorial representations and abstract worksheets.



We also learned how to count forwards and backwards within 100 and how to partition numbers within 100 using a place value chart. We also used number tracks and number lines.

We have started reading *10 Things I Can Do To Save My World* in English and we have learnt so much already, it's a great book! We have learnt that it is better to walk to school rather than travelling by car and that we should switch off the lights when we leave a room. It is also important to recycle and to try and reuse things. We have made some lovely story maps of the book. Here are some images from our story maps!



We have had a super start to our final term in Somalia class

This term we are learning all about Superheroes. A superhero is a person who carries out a heroic deed. They often have a special power that helps them to carry out their task. Mae and Emmelyn started the week by writing about their favourite superheroes in the superhero headquarters.



During our literacy lesson this week we looked at the features of a comic strip and created our own superhero stories using speech bubbles.



During our expressive arts and design sessions we made superhero puppets and masks to help us extend our role play ideas.



And finally, we made a bar chart to see which superhero was our favourite. Can you count up the names and see which one we liked best?
