19 May (Thursday) LAG B'OMER Jewish

The Omer lasts 49 days from Pesach to Shavuot - it is a time of sadness in the Jewish faith, which recalls a great plague in the Roman times.

Omer is relieved on the 33rd day with Lag B'Omer.

Weddings often take place on this day, since they are not usually permitted during the rest of the Omer period.

Traditionally Bonfires are also lit to celebrate bringing light into the world, which were used to mark the start of the months; but banned during the plague by the Romans.



It is a person's sexual body parts, chromosomes & hormones.


A person can be born female, male or intersex.







Uniform expectations 1




- ▶ A Rye College blazer is compulsory and should be worn at all times in and around school.
 - ▶ Students may remove in lessons with the permission of their teacher;
- ▶ Wear a white shirt and tie or a polo shirt;
 - ▶ Year 7-8 polo shirts are black with the Rye College logo;
 - ▶ Year 9-11 polo shirts are black or purple with the Rye College logo;
- ▶ Rye College school jumpers are optional;
 - ▶ No hoodies, sweatshirts or other non-school jumpers;




Uniform expectations 2




- ▶ **Plain black smart trousers;**
 - ▶ No leggings, jeggings, cargo trousers, jeans or jogging bottoms;
- ▶ **Plain black or grey tailored shorts;**
- ▶ **Black tailored skirt worn to their full length or a pinafore dress;**
 - ▶ Skirts must not be made of lycra;
 - ▶ To be worn with black opaque tights or black knee-length socks;
- ▶ **Shoes must be plain black with no visible logos;**
 - ▶ No boots, heels, logos, stripes or coloured markings;



Uniform expectations 3





- ▶ **Jewellery is limited to watches and stud earrings for health and safety reasons**
 - ▶ Other piercings and jewellery are not permitted and students will be asked to remove them;
- ▶ **Natural-looking make-up only;**
 - ▶ No false eye lashes, spray tans, exaggerated eyeliner;
- ▶ **Hair should be a natural colour;**
 - ▶ Bright-coloured hair dye is not acceptable;
- ▶ **For health and safety reasons, nail varnish and nail extensions are not permitted.**



Basic standards

- ▶ **Be on school site by 8:55am;**
- ▶ **Arrive at every lesson and tutor time on time;**
- ▶ **No toilet breaks during lessons unless you have a toilet pass;**
- ▶ **Mobile phones are turned off and left in school bags during the day.**
 - ▶ ‘on site and out of sight’;
 - ▶ If you need to contact home/family, please do so via the school’s reception;
 - ▶ Headphones/earbuds must not be used or worn during school;
 - ▶ No games devices.





Accountability from Monday 10th January

- ▶ No use of phones, earphones etc. on site.


- ▶ If you do not comply, expect a detention.

 - ▶ be placed in solo study for the day.




Behaviour System
