SEAHORSES



In Seahorses we have absolutely loved learning about the Great Fire of London. We have found out so many facts, including how the fire spread so quickly due to the wind and the houses being built closely together. We have enjoyed reading Toby and the Great Fire of London by Margaret Nash and used our senses of sight, smell, taste, sound and touch to write some fantastic setting descriptions. We have worked hard to use our imaginations and collect a range of exciting vocabulary within our writing. On our D.T. day we made a variety of bread rolls, complete with sesame seed, pumpkin seed or poppy seed toppings and they tasted delicious. It was a fun new experience learning how to knead the dough and understanding how the yeast works to make the dough rise whilst the bread is proving.

In Art we have produced some brilliant fire pictures using sugar paper, chalks and silhouettes as well as experimenting with tissue paper.









SEA TURTLES



Sea Turtles have thoroughly enjoyed their Great Fire of London topic. In English, they have written some amazing descriptive pieces about, 'Toby and the Great Fire of London'.

In art, Sea Turtles have created some colourful Great Fire of London chalk drawings and collages.

In science, we have been learning about everyday materials, their properties and uses.

The highlight of the term so far has been our visit from Rye Fire Brigade. The children had the opportunity to sit in the fire engine, learn about the different fire fighting apparatus the fire fighters use and man the hose. They also learnt some very important information on fire safety.

We researched different animals that live in the Antarctica, combining our learning in science to look at how these animals have adapted over time to withstand the harsh conditions of Antarctica. Our notes from this research will support us in completing a non-chronological report on our animal of choice.






DOLPHINS

We would like to remind you that the school day starts at 8.30am and finishes at $3.00 \, \mathrm{pm}$


More and more children are arriving late to school each morning. Children must be in school by 8:45am. Children arriving after this time miss out on their early

We have also had a significant increase in parents being late collecting their child from school and after school clubs. Please arrive on time, teachers have other commitments after school, such as staff meetings and after school clubs.

We have also had a number of parents needing to collect before the end of the school day. This not only interrupts the school office but subsequently the class and their learning when the office has to call in the middle of lesson time. Please, where possible book medical appointments outside of school hours.

As you will be aware, this year we have been sending personalised, RAG-rated attendance letters for your child(ren), each term. If your child's attendance is below 95% we would like to be able to work with you and your child to see this improve, before we issue the next RAG-rated letter at the end of Term 4.
