This Sundays Readings

29TH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

First Reading: Exodus 17:8-13

As long as Moses kept his arm raised, Israel had the advantage

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses' arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

Response: Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2

The man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures – from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! May the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ enlighten the eyes of our mind, so that we can see what hope his call holds for us Alleluia!

Gospel Reading Luke 18:1-8

The parable of the unjust judge

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death.""

And the Lord said 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'

REFLECTION

Persistence in our prayer life is an important part of being a Christian. We believe that God hears our prayers and that He acts upon them. Sometimes He answers quickly, and we receive the graces we have requested, at other times He seems to act very slowly but eventually we begin to see His influence on events and although the outcome is not always what we sought we find the strength to understand.

The Old Testament readings are often difficult to understand but we must recognise that they are the story of a people who worshipped God. What we find in the Bible is a mixture of history, poetry, culture, prophesy, law, and faith. Israel was beset on all sides by other nations who fought for the same land. Today the Amalekites attack Israel and they come to battle at Rephidim. Moses prays to the Lord for victory and, as long as he kept his arms raised. Israel had the advantage. When his prayer waned, Israel began to fail, but the persistence of Moses, helped by Aaron and Hur, saved the day and Israel triumphed over their aggressors.

Scripture too, is of great importance to our faith. Paul's letter to Timothy, which is proclaimed today, is filled with the special qualities that the Word brings into our lives. He tells us "All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy". Through the Word we gain the wisdom that leads us to salvation; its proclamation is a solemn duty, and the message that is contained within must be insisted upon no matter what the opposition we face.

The story of the unjust judge and the poor widow is used by Jesus to emphasise the importance of prayer. Because the widow would not be denied justice but prayed to God and persevered with her case the judge eventually found in her favour. When Jesus began his ministry, many people had grown weary of the injustices of life, they had lost faith and turned away from prayer. Jesus promises that we must keep faith in His Father, persevere in prayer and justice will come. Prayer comes from faith, the greater our faith the more we need to pray.




