This Sundays Readings

30TH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

First Reading: Ecclesiasticus 35:12-14, 16-1

The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds

The Lord is a judge who is no respecter of personages.

He shows no respect of personages to the detriment of a poor man, he listens to the plea of the injured party.

He does not ignore the orphan's supplication, nor the widow's as she pours out her story.

The man who with his whole heart serves God will be accepted, his petitions will carry to the clouds.

The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds, until it arrives he is inconsolable,

until it arrives he is inconsolable, And the Lord will not be slow, nor will he be dilatory on their behalf.

Response: This poor man called; the Lord has heard him.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 4:6-8,16-18

All there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me

My life is already being poured away as a libation, and the time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith; all there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that Day; and not only to me but to all those who have longed for his Appearing.

The first time I had to present my defence, there was not a single witness to support me. Every one of them deserted me – may they not be held accountable for it. But the Lord stood by me and gave me power, so that through me the whole message might be proclaimed for all the pagans to hear; and so I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from all evil attempts on me, and bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Reading Luke 18:9-14

The tax collector, not the Pharisee, went home justified.

Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else: 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get." The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

REFLECTION

Have you ever wondered where is God? We seek Him in so many ways in prayer, celebration, nature, music, art, literature; but struggle to find Him. Perhaps we spend too much time searching and not enough time just sitting and waiting for Him to reveal Himself.

The author of Ecclesiasticus gives us an insight into his idea of where God is to be found. The passage speaks to me of the prayers of petition in which we call to God for his help. We are told that God is a judge who does not consider our human ideas of place or station in life but looks deep into the heart of the petitioner and answers our prayer in a way that brings an outcome that we have the strength to accept. There is no one, who calls to Him, who will not be answered, the waiting time may be long, but the answer is given with love.

Today's Psalm and the Letter to Timothy should be read together for they appear to be in harmony; in the psalm the petitioner is confident that his prayer will be heard. and that God will save Him from all that surrounds him. Paul echoes the beautiful message of the psalm as he faces some great difficulty in his life. Paul too is confident that his prayer will be answered. One phrase stands out in the Gospel; the Pharisee speaks "this prayer to himself": contrast this with the tax collector who calls out in his pain "God, be merciful to me, a sinner". Now judge whose petition will be heard; Jesus, through the language and tone of the passage, leaves us in no doubt. God is to be found everywhere, but we need to be prepared to discern his presence even in those places and situations where he seems so far away. God is there, in the humblest of surroundings and among those who are the least in our society, perhaps He is there because we are not! So. when you pray, give yourself time to just sit and be still; then speak your petition with a pure heart, pray with humility, and wait. patiently, on God's time, for His answer,


that God was pleased with the tax collector's prayer?
