

YEAR 6

This week in Year 6, children have been practising hard for the end of year musical which will be performed on Monday and Tuesday of next week. I am really proud of the way that they have worked together.



As well as that, they have been learning some of the history of Maths including the beginnings of numerals. They have used Napier's Rods - named after John Napier (1550–1617) who was a Scottish mathematician particularly interested in calculation. He created a system of number rods which were used to make multiplying and dividing easier. The method was commonly used for about 200 years until mechanical calculators were developed. They agreed that the method was easy to use and very helpful! Some children have also been trying hard to disprove Goldbach's Conjecture!



KS2 ROBOTICS

Key stage 2 learnt all about Robotics this Wednesday. An IT expert came into the school and explained how robots are becoming more and more common in our daily lives. He showed children that robots are being developed all the time, and explained that during our lifetimes they will continue to take over more and more human activities. Children considered the advantages and disadvantages of this robotic future. Robots can take over some boring or dangerous jobs, but as many as 40% of jobs in the UK and 70% of jobs in India are at risk because of the increased use of these robots.




The Consultant showed them lots of different robotic models and children were then able to control different robots to make them complete tasks

requiring precision and accuracy. They used bananas, carrots and tin foil linked to electrical circuits to draw a house on screen. They also experimented and played

with some of the other robots which could do wheelies, little dances, play songs and follow a path on a map. Some children used programmes to move Lego models and a robot.





The children really enjoyed the sessions which were great fun, but

they also gave children a fantastic insight into the important role that Robotics will play in all our futures.
