Today is the feast day of St Joseph the Worker, and so it seems appropriate to draw your attention to this painting by Gerard van Honthorst entitled *The Childhood of Christ*



Van Honthorst was a Dutch painter in the style of Caravaggio, who popularised the technique of 'chiaroscuro' that draws on the contrast between light and darkness. It depicts Jesus as a boy, apprenticed to the vocation of his human father, a carpenter. Here is Jesus, learning at home with his parents, just as you have been this week. I am sure we all experience moments of light and darkness in our busy weeks but equally I hope there is the opportunity to recognise and cherish this time as a gift, the time to be together, to work together, to learn new things in different way. I suspect there may be some aspects we will miss when it's all over!








Tidy up around you, Help load or unload the dishwasher,


Be kinder then necessary,





