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

Remembering VE Day – 8 May 1945

We turned left to walk beside a wall facing the Palace. I recall Dad finding a space around half way along where I sat on the wall and we settled in for what seemed to me to be a lengthy period of time during which it was exciting to see thousands of very cheerful people pouring in from the Mall. At last, the King, Queen and Winston Churchill appeared on the balcony of the Palace. There was tremendous cheering, clapping, shouting and waving. They waved to us all. I remember joining in the shouting, but shouting what I have no idea! I am aware that Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret were also on the balcony but I cannot remember seeing them. After all this excitement, I can recall no more, not even how we got home!"
