FOUNDATION STAGE

This week the children in Foundation Stage have been using their imagination both in school and at home. They have used their imagination to think about everyday things but also had the chance to explore fairytales. They have created and described their cloud pictures inspired by the book 'Little Cloud' by Eric Carle.

On Wednesday they become witches inventing potions made out of very interesting ingredients. They have also had great fun creating works of art from food. Reception children learnt a new sound, 'igh', so became knIGHts; designing shields and building castles (with the addition of some princesses). It would not have been complete without a day on fairies: children made wands, fairy houses and gardens. An extremely busy yet exciting week of learning, ending in a Funky Friday zoom session for Reception.



As it is the Big Garden Bird Watch, we have been learning about birds in Science this week and have tried to spot and recognise the different types of this lovely species in our gardens. We will continue keeping a tally during the weekend. One of the children managed to get so close up to a pigeon he could have touched it!

English comprehension focused on birds too and for Art we learned how to draw an owl picture and chose our colour carefully.

We also started sharing the fable 'The Tortoise and the Hare' and drew a story map to help us practise retelling this interesting story. In PSHE we looked for the special helpers as, wherever kindness and generosity.



What a busy and imaginative week we've had in Year 2! We've been weighing using Kg and g and reading scales in Maths; looking at changing the shape of materials using forces in Science when we created models of the Big Bad Wolf; and in Geography, we've designed our own creative Barefoot Islands using keys. In English, we've written imaginative instructions for how to get around Fairyland. Well done, Year 2 for all your super work!

In Year 3 we have continued to study Greek myths writing our own versions in the first person and creating comic strips. In our Art lesson we had to devise a portrait of either ourselves or a family member which incorporated 5 objects to give clues to that person and their interests. The children could work in any media they chose and came up with a range including painting, pencil, collage and pen. As part of our History topic the children were challenged to have a go at making a Stone Age weapon or tool. Their ingenuity and skill tell me they would have survived well as Stone Age people!



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It has been yet another busy week in Year 4. In English, we looked at list poems and the art of writing a Kenning. The children wrote Kennings about an animal of their choice and I had to guess the animal from their

In Geography, the children made some super booklets about the Arctic/Antarctica and in Science we learnt about how materials change state when they are heated or cooled. Some children even conducted their own investigations by making ice cream! In Art, we looked at the Anglo-Saxon craft of illuminating letters and the children created some wonderful illuminated letters of their own. After all that learning it was definitely time for a break and the children finished off the week with Tungle roaver some calming yoga exercises! 
