<i>inference</i>	A conclusion reached on the basis of evidence and reasoning.
<i>cohesive devices</i>	Refers to the conjunctions, connectives and pronouns used to link the parts of a piece of writing
<i>longitude</i>	The angular distance of a place east or west of the Greenwich meridian, or west of the standard meridian of a celestial object, usually expressed in degrees and minutes
<i>latitude</i>	The angular distance of a place north or south of the earth's equator, or of the equator of a celestial object, usually expressed in degrees and minutes.
<i>ensemble</i>	A group of musicians, actors, or dancers who perform together.
<i>palaeontologist</i>	Someone who studies fossils as a way of getting information about the history of life on Earth.
<i>adaptation</i>	The process of change by which an organism or species becomes better suited to its environment.
<i>evolution</i>	The gradual process by which different kinds of living organism are believed to have developed from earlier forms during the history of the earth.
<i>chronological</i>	A record of events following the order in which they occurred.
<i>inherited</i>	A quality, characteristic, or predisposition derived genetically from one's parents or ancestors.
