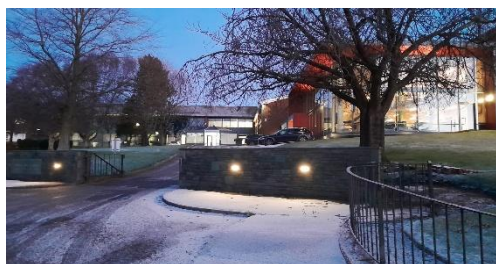

Dear Parents / Carers,



Welcome back to the Lent term and a new calendar year. We've had a cold and frosty start, but after two weeks away, it has been great to be back with Team St Michael's and to catch up with pupils and staff.

We are incredibly proud of how pupils have started the term; walking around school, I see behaviour that is exceptional and quality learning taking place in classrooms.

Pupils have largely returned to school looking so smart too; thank you for all your support with this, it makes such a difference when we all work together.

Mr Kirkpatrick led our first worship of 2026, focussing on Epiphany; the visit of the Magi, the three kings, to the Christ Child. We looked at historical representations of the event and some thoughts on the significance of the 12 days of Christmas. Mr Kirkpatrick encouraged us to think about the wider meaning of an epiphany; that moment of realisation or revelation, just as Saul had when travelling on the road to Damascus and Jesus appeared to him. He ended with one of the most quoted verses in the Bible, John 3:16 and reminded us of the hope that this symbolises, 'for God so loved the world, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life'. Wow, what a way to start the term!

We are so privileged at St Michael's to have wonderful buildings and grounds. The site team are constantly working to maintain and enhance the learning environment for our pupils and one of the current projects, which has resumed this week, is upgrading the fire doors and surrounds and paintwork and décor along some of the corridors. Whilst we are very fortunate to receive government CIF funding, so many of the projects we undertake in school (the upgrade to the hall, the Armstrong Centre, the glasshouse) are only made possible because of your generous donations to The St Michael's Trust and their ongoing support, for which we are very grateful. The sport continued on Thursday,

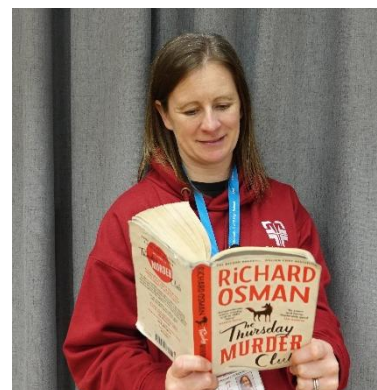
