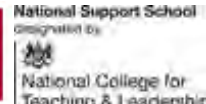
The Governors have had one round of interviews for the new Headteacher, and decided not to appoint anyone. I'm sure you will agree that if the right person isn't there, then the better decision is not to appoint rather than appoint the wrong person. As a Headteacher has to give their current school a term's notice that means that we won't have a new Headteacher for September. However, we have a very experienced leadership team, all of whom have worked in the school longer than me. The governors have invited Mrs J. Siddle to be the Acting Headteacher with Mr M. Baines and Mr I. Baybutt as Acting Deputy Headteachers until a permanent appointment is made. The leadership team know the school extremely well, and will ensure it continues to do its work very effectively. As is usual at this time of the school year a few staff changes are happening, but I anticipate that very little will change in the wider school.

17 Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

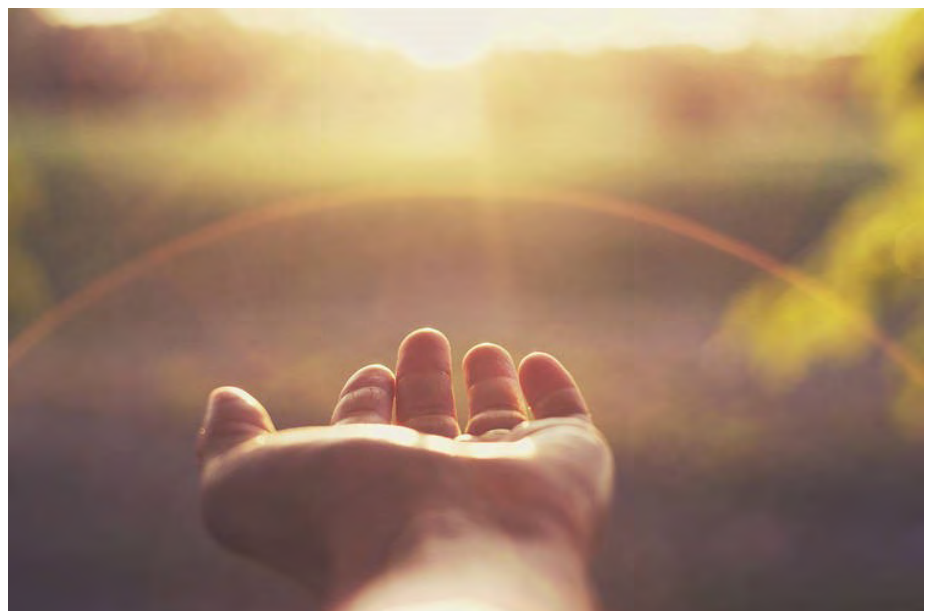

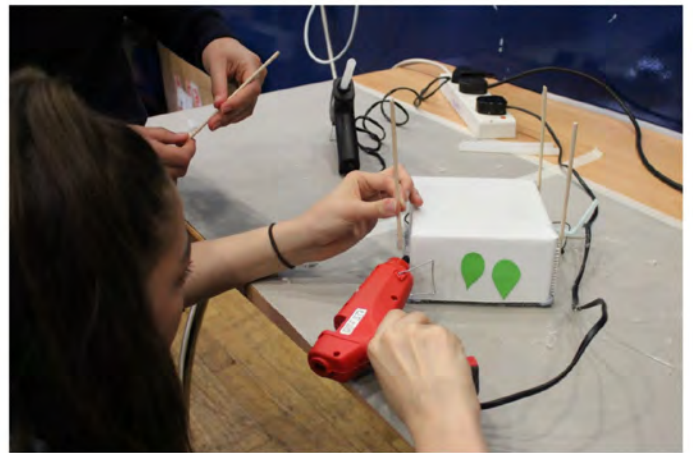
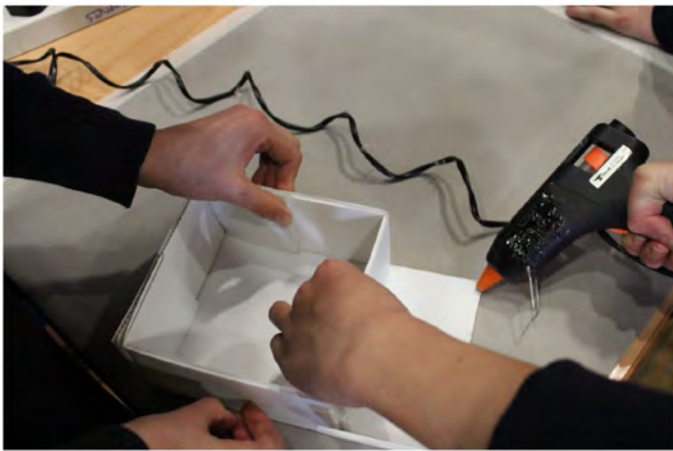
They were fascinated by a talk given by Mrs Jackson, followed by watching Archie peck his

YEAR 8 PUPILS PROBLEM SOLVE IN DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY STEM EVENT SPONSORED BY BAE SYSTEMS AND DELIVERED BY THE SMALLPEICE TRUST



At the beginning of May a representative from the Smallpeice Trust came to Archbishop Temple School to run a STEM activity with sixty pupils in year 8.

Christine James from the Smallpeice Trust had been to us in 2018 and knew she would have a good response from our pupils.

A STEM Day session starts with students taking part in a Personal, Learning and Thinking Skills (PLTS) exercise to help identify the best role for them in the main project. They then get the chance to put their creativity and problem-solving skills to work with others on fun design-and-make projects.

Our pupils were placed into ten teams and all given the task of designing a container that could collect rainwater and once it had reached a certain level, a circuit sensor would activate a pump.

The idea was based on a company who want to harvest rain water from their office roof to use to flush toilets, fill a



water feature and to water in-door plants, therefore reducing their water bill and avoiding using drinking water for waste water needs.

Year 8 pupils worked hard all morning, designing and creating their solutions. Whilst most teams produced successful working outcomes, some leaked and others had pump failures. They were all required to present their projects (Dragon's Den style) with costings, USP's and with a strong poster campaign. Christine James was duly impressed, saying that there were some very creative solutions with designs no other school had come up with. Pupils thoroughly enjoyed the morning, although they found aspects quite challenging it allowed them to bring in knowledge from many subjects, to help solve, in a

practical way, an environmental issue.

I look forward to our pupils benefitting from the opportunity to take part in a similar challenge provided by the Smallpeice Trust and supported by BAE Systems.

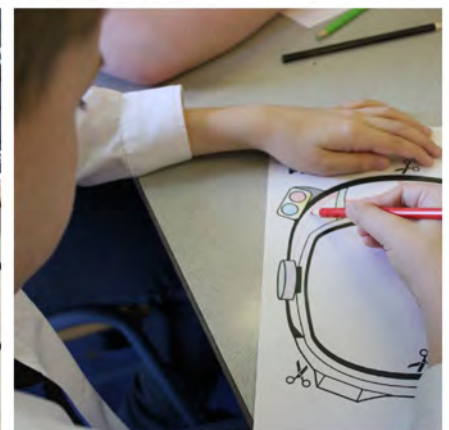


sessions. The day was a great opportunity for pupils to get a taste of life at secondary school.

TWO SCIENCE LABORATORIES UNDERGO REFURBISHMENT

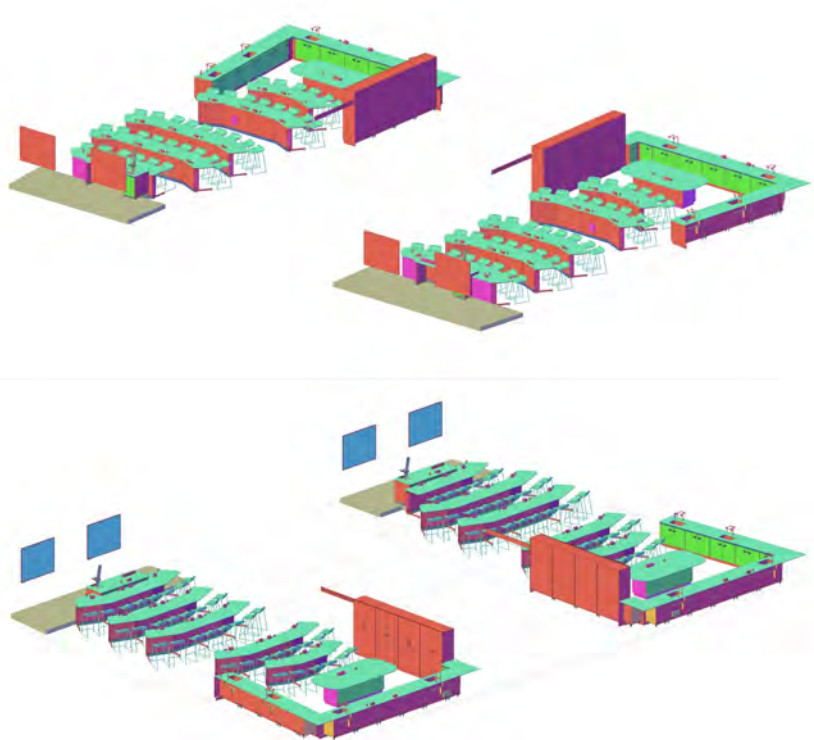
The Science department is very excited to announce the major refurbishment of two of its science laboratories which will be completed ready for use in September.

"I didn't know many people before I came here," said Alex. "I made new friends in lessons. If you are worried about anything the best thing to do is to speak to your teacher or to your parents."

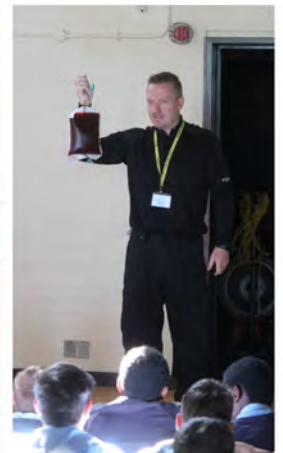
"Don't feel nervous," said Aaliyah. "Try and talk to people."



CHOOSE LIFE, NOT THE KNIFE

A police officer from Lancashire Police's Armed Response Department came into school on Wednesday 22nd May to deliver a special presentation to pupils in years 9 and 10 on gangs and knife crime. 'Choose Life, Not the Knife' was devised to allay any fears pupils had regarding knife crime, to talk about the legalities regarding carrying and buying knives, the immediate and future consequences of carrying a knife and the devastation caused by knife crime.

Pupils listened intently as the officer outlined that 'Lancashire is a safe place to live' and described the different ways we can keep it that way. He spoke about the circumstances leading up to knife crimes and how pupils, if they are worried about a situation escalating, can act and reduce risks. He talked about gangs and criminal grooming, outlining ways in which pupils can make

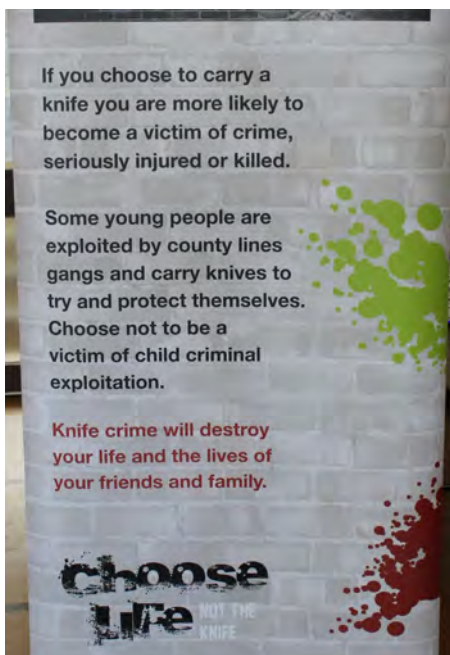


positive choices in their lives when faced with negative influences. Pupils listened as he talked about the police's response to knife and gang crime and the steps pupils can take if they are concerned, about themselves, friends or family members.

Our next meeting is on **Thursday 3rd October at 7pm in the Music Block.** All parents/carers are welcome to attend.

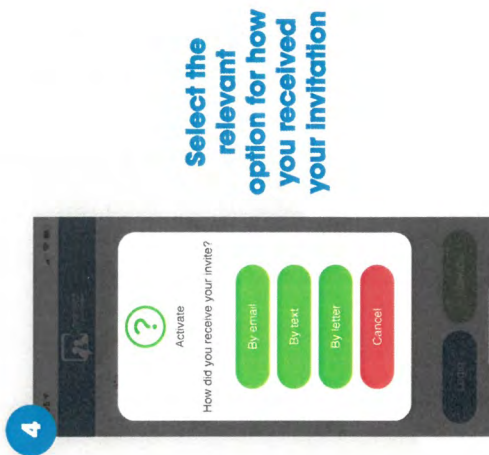
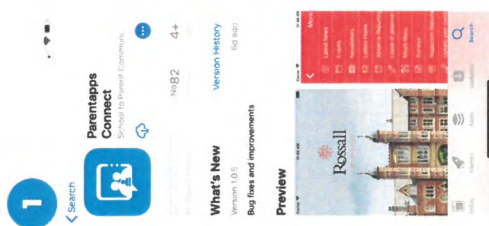

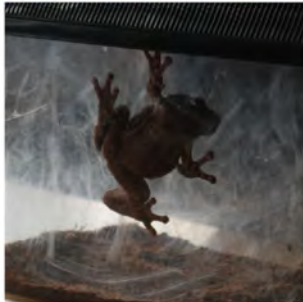

ZOOLAB RAINFOREST ROADSHOW

On Thursday 20th June 2019 we were lucky enough to get a visit from 'ZooLab', who brought in a variety of rainforest animals such as snakes, tree frogs, and tarantulas. We were given the opportunity to hold some of these exotic creatures and learn more about them and the habitat they reside in.

First we looked at the creatures which would be found on the forest floor. These included giant African snails, cockroaches, spiders and, surprisingly, hedgehogs! We learnt lots of interesting facts about each animal – for example, if you dropped a tarantula they would be badly damaged as they are incredibly fragile. Also, the tarantula protects itself by flicking its hairs into predator's eyes.



Next we moved onto animals from the under canopy layer. Lydia, the rainforest ranger, brought out a royal python and we had the chance to hold the snake ourselves. Many people think snakes will feel slimy, but we were surprised how soft the snake actually was. Learning about how snakes kill their prey was really interesting.

The final layer of the rainforest is the canopy, and this is where we would find tree frogs. The tree frog had to remain in its container because if we were to touch it, we may accidentally damage the frog's skin with the oils on our fingertips.

Overall, we all really enjoyed the visit from 'ZooLab' and found it really helpful to support the work we've been doing in lessons. We all came away from the session having learnt something new, and we would recommend 'ZooLab' to everyone!

YEAR 8 GEOGRAPHY FIELD VISIT TO CLEVELEYS

On Wednesday 19th June 2019, sixty-five year 8 Geography pupils had the opportunity to visit Cleveleys beach to investigate the different coastal management strategies in place. This links directly to the Coastal Environment unit we are currently studying in lessons.



On arrival, we went down to the beach to examine the coastal management strategies for ourselves. Along Cleveleys beach, there are multiple groynes and an extensive sea wall. The groynes are put in place to trap sediment that is being transported along the beach via the process of longshore drift, and the purpose of the day was to collect data to test whether these management strategies are effective or not. We spent about an hour examining the groynes; measuring the total length as well as more specific information at equal distances along the length. We also gathered data on the amount of sediment trapped by the groyne and did this by measuring three pieces of sediment at each location, as well as judging its angularity using the 'Power's Scale of Roundness'. Once we had

gathered all this information, we were able to sit on the sea wall and complete a field sketch looking over the beach.

Overall we found this experience engaging and all involved had a lovely morning out of school. Maybe next time we will have enough time to enjoy an ice cream at the beach too!

CRICKET

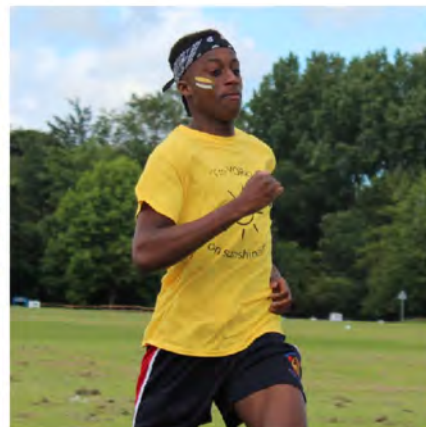
