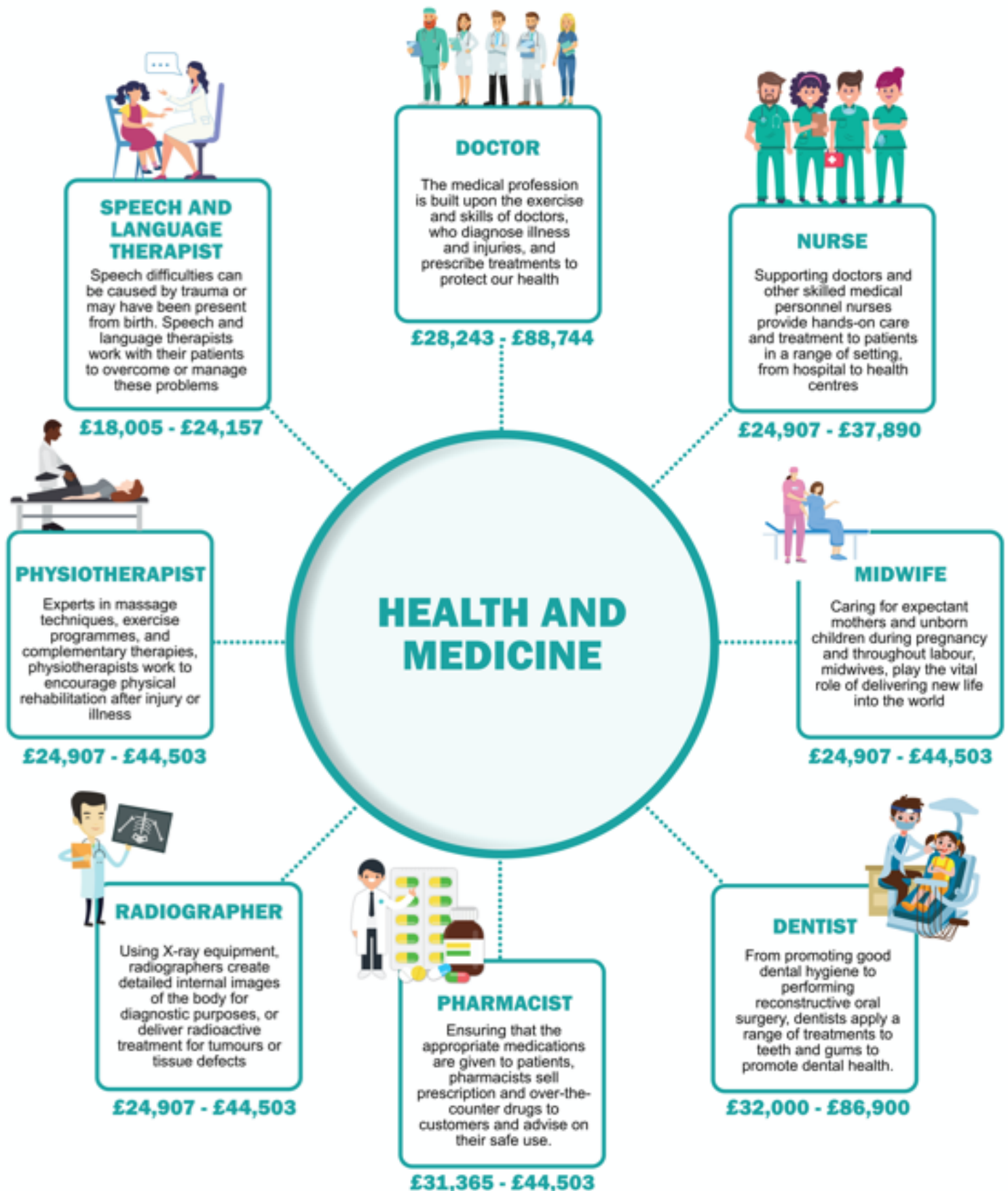

CAREERS IN THE NHS

Covid-19 has put a huge demand on both the NHS and social services. The government has launched a National campaign to ask ex hospital staff to return and asked those studying degrees in nursing and social care to start work now.

The jobs that are in most demand within the health service are:-

- Doctor
- Nurse
- Clinical Psychologist
- Pharmacist
- Health Care Assistant
- Occupational Therapist
- Social Worker
- Counsellor
- Care Assistants

There is also a huge demand for care assistants to work in care homes and the community as more and more people are admitted to care homes and those vulnerable need care at home.



RETAIL/SHOPPING & FOOD CHAINS

Covid-19 has put a huge strain on the retail and food market. Many shops are closed however the supermarkets are the busiest they have been in a long time!! More and more people are ordering online and the home delivery service cannot cope with the current demand hence click and collect is now very popular. Amazon has also had record sales as people are ordering DIY products, Gym equipment and gifts on line.

The jobs that are in most demand within retail are:-

- Retail Assistants
- Personal Shoppers
- Delivery drivers
- HGV Drivers
- Warehouse operatives

TAKE AWAY FOOD

Covid-19 has seen the closure of many restaurants and public houses. Some businesses are trading from home and offering food delivery services, others are offering contactless click and collect food. There has been an up rise of food delivery services over the last few weeks and more and more businesses are offering hot meals to be delivered to your door and afternoon teas.

ONLINE SERVICES

With the closure of banks, non essential goods stores and schools and councils providing limited services the demand for online services is massive. Most services you can now access on line.
