2021-22

Things are mostly normal...



- You will have a 'nearly'* full set of exams in the May/June.
- However, there is an acceptance and understanding that your path through GCSEs and A-Levels has not been smooth.

• So...

What is different? What is changing to support me?



- In each subject, one of three things:
 - Advance notice of topics present on your exam (W/C 7th February).
 - A formula sheet to ensure you don't have to remember equations – Maths, Physics etc.
 - Removal of certain elements of courses no fieldwork in Geography, no formal exam in Art etc.

A Little More Detail...



- Choice of topics in GCSE English Literature and History exams.
- Choice of content in GCSE Geography (the removal of required fieldwork).
- Changes to the requirements for the delivery of practical activities in Science subjects (students can learn about required practical activities through teacher demonstration and not actively doing them).
- Assessment in Art and Design will be on students' portfolio work only and not practical exam.
- The provision of support materials (formula sheets) in GCSE Mathematics, Physics and Combined Science exams.
- The provision of advance information on the focus of the content of exams, in the majority of subjects at GCSE, AS and A level (in all subjects apart from the ones listed above). This advanced notice on some of the content of exams will be sent out by exam boards between 7th February-28th February 2022. The amount of content students are aware of in advance will differ from subject to subject.

A 'Golden' Opportunity



- The context of the last two years is very difficult. However, you are potentially going to know up to 50% of the content of your exams.
- '2019 students would give their right arm for some advanced notice'.
- Some form of support in every subject.
- Revision on the 'known' content is key.

What About Grading?



- 2022 will be a 'transition year' to reflect the fact that we are in a pandemic recovery period and students' education has been disrupted.
- The aim is for grades in 2022 to reflect a midway point between 2021 and 2019. This means that results overall next year will be higher than in 2019 but not as high as in 2020.
- Exam boards will use data as a starting point, to align their standards in a subject but the grade boundaries for each specification will be set by the senior examiners after they have reviewed the work produced by students.

What About Results Days?



- The government have announced that GCSE and A-Level results days are going back to the usual format of being on separate weeks as below:
 - Thursday 18th August A-Level (Year 13) Results Day
 - Thursday 25th August GCSE (Year 11) Results Day
- Further details about these days will be sent out during the Summer term in 2022.


Structure of the Exams




AQA Exam Board

- 6 Exams 1 hour and 15 minutes long
 - Separate Science (11C1): 1 hour 45 minutes
- 2 Biology, 2 Chemistry, 2 Physics
- 70 marks
 - Separate Science: 100 marks
- Each exam is 16.7% of the total grade (combined science)
 - Separate science is 50% each of Paper
 1 and Paper 2 per subject.

PROVISIONAL Exam Dates



- Chemistry Paper 1: 27th May AM
- Physics Paper 1: 9th June AM
- Biology Paper 2: Monday 15th June AM
- Chemistry Paper 2: Thursday 20th June AM
- Physics Paper 2: Tuesday 23rd June AM



The Exam Breakdown



- Required practicals make up 15% of exam
- Maths component: 10% biology, 20% chemistry, 30% physics
- 40% of exam is recall knowledge
- 40% of exam is application of knowledge
- 20% analysing information



Revising for Exams

Why should you revise?



 Your brain forgets details of the work you did months ago,

But...

• You need these details to answer the questions in the exam,

So...

• You need to 'top-up', by using the correct revision technique.

Where should you revise?



- In a quiet room, perhaps a bedroom, warm and well-lit, with a table to work at.
- Ideally, with a table-lamp, to help you to focus on the page, with a clock for timing (later...).

When should you revise?




 Start your revision early each evening, before your brain gets tired.


How should you revise?



- If you just sit down to revise,
- Without a definite finishing time, then your learning efficiency falls lower and lower, like this:

Revision cards

Mind maps

Revision journeys

Transforming notes

Parent Tips



- Weekly review of revision timetable.
- Monthly review of revision materials produced revision cards, mind maps, and revision journeys. Information PP available on our website
- Review of type of revision are students only trying to memorise material or are they using exam questions ?
- Front of fridge/In-tray idea to avoid conflict between students and parents – revision materials timetables could be left in an agreed place (at an agreed time) for parents to check. This then takes the conversation element out of this process.
- Use of staff email please contact us if you have any issues with individual subjects or any overall issues.
- If it doubt, please contact us.
- Use of parent guides (these PowerPoints) to be involved in student's work.

Marginal Gains – Exam Technique

- A dividing 'current' folder keeps revision resources together.
- A cheap analogue white background watch (and board pen) ...
- Buy a pack of BIC black pens and 2-3 packs of cheap highlighters.
- Get your parents to buy you a 'case' of bottle water.
- Decide if you like bananas.
- If you don't eat breakfast, possibly start from about March/April. If not, try BelVita!
- Walking/running the night before exams (cold showers).
- Talk to your employers now if you can't we will!
- Pin your exam timetable up and cross them off.
- May half-term 2-3 days blocked out.







Marginal Gains – Every Day

- Go to bed 30 mins earlier that is 2.5 hours per week.
- Minimise arguments with parents... buy a letter tray.
- Stop drinking energy drinks.
- Talk to your parents about your 'incentives'.
- Eat breakfast.
- Ask for a mentor...
- Exams only What's App group.
- Plan a day out the week you finish exams.
- Check Show My Homework first thing on Monday and last thing on Friday.
- Realise who your mates are.
- Buy a stash of the revision stationery you need.
- Carry your revision guides/revision cards with you as much as possible revision opportunities.



Items that may be useful during revision period...



- Rainbow revision cards allows students to have a different coloured revision card per subject. These are available from Wilkinsons.
- Revision card holder students learnt how to produce flashcards today This is useful to collate their work.
- A3 paper for mind maps/revision journeys (again techniques learnt by students today).




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When used effectively, GCSEPod can have a **BIG** impact on final grades!


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Just like training for a marathon, you need to start early and train little and often.

Students who used GCSEPod over the WHOLE year, not just during exams, achieved greater results.













