#### This Season...

Spring is a beautiful time of year to be outdoors, although it can be colder than expected sometimes, so we can continue to snuggle in the yurt with the wood burner roasting marshmallows and enjoying hot chocolate treats. The pupils will learn about the season

of Spring and what to expect. They will be supported to explore and investigate using all of their senses what Springtime means, how we celebrate it and what happens to the trees, animals and how we can help to look after the site during this time.

We will be looking for signs of Spring on the ground, in the canopy and in the air as we start to welcome back the birds, but we have had regular visits from a robin and some blackbirds throughout the winter, and on the ground, the green shoots of crocuses, snowdrops and daffodils are showing. It's still important for us to keep feeding the birds and watching out for any other signs of other life such as rabbits, foxes, hedgehogs and toads, as they will be emerging as the weather warms up.



## Sensory Learners

Making music in the forest school for Winter and Spring using crunchy leaves and experiencing the frost and maybe the snow. Look for signs of Spring, birds and new shoots.

They will also experience sensory stories and Forest themed sensology with objects to touch, taste and smell based on the theme of Winter and Spring

#### Weather
