Attendance & Punctuality


Our aim is for 96% attendance over the whole school and from Christmas to Easter we have achieved just slightly below this at 95.2%. Well done Y3!

As well as having the highest attendance, Y3 have also been the most punctual class with the fewest late arrivals since September. Y4s are not doing quite so well, with the most children being late and over 120 starts to the day being affected!

If your child arrives after the second bell (at 8.55am), they will be recorded as being late. Children who arrive on time settle more quickly and are ready for the start of the teaching session.

From Monday 29th April, there will be a book in the office to record the names of children who are late and the reason for this.

Please only use this as an extra to the reading you already do at home. Too much time looking at screen can be harmful to your child's social, emotional, communication and physical development.
