Code of Conduct

In the same way as the children in school need to follow our behaviour policy and the staff have a Code of Conduct (produced by Lancashire County Council), a Parental Code of Conduct has been created to explain our expectations for Parents. Please read it carefully - it will be in the separate email with other attachments and is on the school website - Parents - Policies and Procedures.

Collection and Drop Off

We have updated our Collection and Drop Off policy and this is on the school website (Parents - Policies and Procedures) for parents to read. We will also send it as an attachment in the separate email. It includes information about who we can let your child go home with, which classes can walk to and from school alone and what happens when parents are late picking up. Please read it and share with anyone responsible for dropping off and picking up your child/ren.

Communication Working Party

We held the first communication meeting this week and discussed the survey results and the points raised by some parents. It was a very positive meeting leading to ideas for improvements. The group were surprised that there were only 33 responses, but were pleased that parents know that there are many lines of communication between school and home. One suggestion was to create an overview of how the forms of communications are used with reasons for why each method is chosen. This will be made and shared with parents as soon as possible. School will also send the newsletter as a single attachment with another email for other relevant attachments. We are looking into how to send the newsletter as the main body of an email, but this is proving difficult as we cannot find a way to do this on the current system (SCOPAY). We cannot send the newsletter via Outlook - which would let us send it on the main body - as blind copying all parents is not set up on that system. SCOPAY makes sure we do not miss anyone out, as it is linked to the school system, and that GDPR (data protection) is adhered to.

The link to the website on the newsletter doesn't seem to work on all devices, but we will leave the link on to remind people to check the Blog. Mrs Walsh apologised for the short turn around time and the following phone calls about taking the children off site. The timing was not good and we will try to get this right next year. Emails will be sent to Priority 1 and 2 parents (based on the order on the data collection form) and texts to Priority 1, due to the cost. The parents at the meeting understood that, even with proof reading, mistakes do happen. Fridays are very busy. We only have one member of the office team and often information is only shared with Mrs Pearce during the afternoon. As Mrs Pearce is supposed to finish work by 4pm, there is only a short amount of time to make sure everything is correct. If you ever notice anything wrong, please contact us. If we spot anything or are notified, we will do our best to change it as soon as possible, pointing out our error, apologising and sharing the correct information. Following another suggestion, we hope to reinstall a noticeboard on the playground so that parents can read the newsletter and see any other information while waiting for the children. Finally, the working party were pleased to read the many positive comments about how well school communicates with parents and commented on the friendly nature of the newsletter. Whilst we always look to improve, it was good to know that parents recognise that we try our best.
