1 Introduction

- 1.1 This policy statement aims to set out the federation's arrangements for managing the access of education and training providers to students for the purposes of giving them information about their offer. It sets out:
 - procedures in relation to requests for access
 - the grounds for granting and refusing requests for access
 - details of premises or facilities to be provided to a person who is given access

2 Statutory requirements

- 2.1 Schools are required to ensure that there is an opportunity for a range of education and training providers to access students in Years 8 to 13 for the purposes of informing them about approved technical education, qualifications or apprenticeships.
- 2.2 Schools must provide a minimum of six encounters with technical education or training providers to all pupils in Years 8 to 13 (see further details below).
- 2.3 Schools must also have a policy statement that outlines the circumstances in which education and training providers will be given access to these students.
- 2.4 This is outlined in section 42B of the <u>Education Act 1997</u>, the <u>Skills and Post-16 Act 2022</u> and on page 43 of guidance from the Department for Education (DfE) on <u>careers guidance and access for education and training providers</u>.
- 2.5 This policy shows how our federation complies with these requirements.

The Six Encounters Schools Must Offer to All Pupils in Years 8 to 13

2.6 Schools must offer:

- two encounters for pupils during the 'first key phase' (Year 8 or 9)
 - o All pupils must attend
 - o Encounters can take place any time during Year 8, and between 1 September and 28 February during Year 9
- two encounters for pupils during the 'second key phase' (Year 10 or 11)
 - o All pupils must attend
 - o Encounters can take place any time during Year 10, and between 1 September and 28 February during Year 11
- two encounters for pupils during the 'third key phase' (Year 12 or 13)
 - o Pupils can choose to attend
 - o Encounters can take place any time during Year 12, and between 1 September and 28 February during Year 13
- 2.7 These encounters must happen for a reasonable period of time during the standard school day. Schools can continue to provide complementary experiences, but encounters outside of school hours won't count towards these requirements.
- 2.8 Schools must ask each provider to provide the following information as a minimum:
 - Information about the provider and the approved qualifications or apprenticeships they offer

- Information about what careers those qualifications and apprenticeships can lead to
- What learning or training with the provider is like
- Answers to any questions from pupils

Meaningful Provider Encounters

2.9 Our federation is committed to providing meaningful encounters to all pupils. An encounter is defined as one meeting/session between pupils and one provider. Meaningful live online engagement is also an option at our school.

3 Student entitlement

- 3.1 All students in Years 8 to 13 in our federation are entitled to:
 - find out about technical education qualifications and apprenticeship opportunities as part of our careers programme, which provides information on the full range of education and training options available at each transition point
 - hear from and speak to a range of local providers about the opportunities they
 offer, including technical education and apprenticeships through careers
 events, options evenings, assemblies and group discussions
 - understand how to make applications for the full range of academic and technical courses

4 Management of provider access requests

- 4.1 A provider wishing to request access should contact the federation's Careers Leader (Mr Drought), relevant Head of School or Assistant Headteacher Post-16.
- 4.2 A number of events, integrated into the federation's careers programme, will offer providers an opportunity to come into school to speak to pupils and/or their parents.
- 4.3 This includes a careers and apprenticeships assembly programme featuring numerous providers e.g. HMRC; Accenture; Careers at Sea; TDR Training; Tyne North Training; Northumberland Skills; RAF, Army and Royal Navy Careers; Port Services Blyth; Northumberland and Tyne & Wear NHS Trust; British Engines; and Northumberland County Council.
