KS3 Main Aims:

Geography: to further develop students understanding of key ideas and processes, to build confidence in students use of key terminology and skills for progression to high school

History: To develop a coherent, chronological narrative of how people's lives have shaped the United Kingdom and how Britain has influenced and been influenced by the wider world. To understand historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance, and use them to make connections, draw contrasts, analyse trends. To understand the methods of historical enquiry, including how evidence is used carefully to make historical claims, and find out how and why contrasting arguments and interpretations of the past have been constructed.
