Maths news:



KS2

In a bid to help our KS2 children become more financially aware, they took part in some Natwest money lessons earlier in the term. Y5 looked at banking and the importance of saving that will help them in the future. Y6 began to look at what borrowing money or credit is, how they can be safe when spending money and also the importance of saving.

To help KS3 enjoy maths, in an alternative way, they took part in some problem solving activities. Y7 worked on number riddles, a crossnumber (similar to a crossword but with numbers), spotting patterns and ski runs. Y8 also attempted different crossnumbers, plus shape patterns and puzzles.

General Election day is always one of my very favourite days: I adore the buzz of speculation about who might get into power; the hope of having a government who will do a good job for the next five years; the thrill of going to the polling station to cast my vote; and the sheer drama of watching the results from each constituency roll in across the night. So, to be lucky enough to be invited to take 15 students to the Houses of Parliament on 4th July this year was one of the genuine highlights of my teaching career!

Every member of staff was asked to nominate students who have shown interest and engagement about politics and the world around them, and then the lucky 15 names were pulled out of hat - five from each of Years 6, 7 and 8.

We had a very long day, meeting at 7.30am and not getting back to Newcastle until 9.25pm that night, but the children were absolutely marvellous throughout the whole day. We travelled by train and tube, squeezed in a visit to the Natural History Museum in the morning, and had a picnic lunch in Parliament Square, where they desperately tried to get caught on camera by some of the news crews assembled there

Then for the big event: our visit to Parliament. We had an amazing tour of the Palace of Westminster, including the House of Commons and the House of Lords. We learned loads about what it's like to work there, and heard some amazing stories about the history of the palace (including about Henry VIII playing tennis inside one of the halls!). Once back at the Education Centre, we did a workshop all about the important work of the House of Lords, and why they are selected for their roles.

We were then visited by Baroness Garden of Frognall (or Sue, as she asked us to call her) who started her career as a teacher and was extremely passionate about her work in the Lords. She told the children that they could ask her anything at all about her work, or her life in general, and they rose to the challenge magnificently. The room was a sea of hands up for over half an hour, as they posed questions to her about her views of other Lords (she really admires how they work together regardless of their political affiliations, but is quite angry about those who want the title but don't do the work), her own political views (she's a proud Liberal Democrat), and her background (her husband was high up in the RAF and also a member of the House of Lords). I was immensely proud of all of our children for the mature and thoughtful questions they asked, and for their incredible manners right across the day.

Then came the journey home - changing tubes in rush hour was stressful, but we were ably assisted by Baroness Garden who happened to be on the same platform as us, and who was only too happy to chat to us again! The train back to Newcastle was full of happy chatter, and it was lovely to see the children mixing across the year groups.

We had such a marvellous day that I am going to desperately apply for places for another visit next year (they're very hard to secure!) in the hope of taking a different 15 children next time. Watch this space...

PE Kit

Essential PE kit to be brought to every lesson:

Royal blue round neck t-shirt with school emblem (only available from Emblematic)

Plain navy blue shorts or SSMS navy blue leggings (leggings only available from Emblematic)

Clean training shoes, suitable for physical activities – not school shoes.

Additional required PE kit:

Royal blue sports hoodie with school logo (only available from Emblematic)

Navy blue football socks.

Optional PE kit:

Plain tracksuit bottoms, preferably navy blue. These are only to be worn in cold weather outdoors with the permission of the PE staff.

PE shorts / SSMS leggings must be worn for all PE lessons. No tracksuit bottoms will be allowed in lessons for the first half term.

Notes about PE kit:

No leggings are permitted for PE other than SSMS leggings from Emblematic.

If your child is unable to bring the correct PE kit for a lesson due to unforeseen circumstances, it is expected that they bring suitable clothing, as close to the PE kit as possible, to take part in the lesson and the school is informed by parent/carer.

Non Participation:

Physical Education is a <u>statutory requirement</u> and it is expected that all students will take part. If, for medical reasons, your child cannot take part in a lesson, the school office must be contacted. This may be via the MCAS APP or by telephone. If the office is not contacted, it will be assumed your child will be taking part in the lesson. If there is a longer term medical reason for non-participation, a medical note from a medical professional will be required.
