Warm-Up	How Perfect Am I? Read the information about present perfect sentences below to children.
	To change a sentence from the past tense into the present perfect tense, you need to use:
	'has' or 'have' + a past tense verb = present perfect tense
	For example, I have travelled a long way.
	Give the children the How Perfect Am I? Game Cards to sort into simple past tense and present perfect tense.
	Can children identify simple past tense and present perfect tense?
Input	Is It Perfect?
	Discuss how the present perfect tense can be used to give more detail about an event in the past. Present perfect tense can be used to describe: • something that happened in the past and is continuing today;
	an action that was completed recently;
	an action that did not happen at a specified time;
	something that happened repeatedly in the past.
	For example:
	My friends have fought about football every day this week.
	Give children the Is It Perfect? Activity Sheet and ask them to choose the correct verb/s to make the given sentences present perfect tense.
	Can children identify and use present perfect tense?
Apply	The Perfect Choice Using The Perfect Choice Activity Sheet, children identify whether simple past tense or present perfect tense have been used within a piece of text about an ongoing tennis match. They then complete a report about an ongoing football match using a combination of simple past tense and present perfect tense.
	Can children identify and use simple past tense and present perfect tense?
