#### Year on year improvement at A Level



- More students than ever achieve 3 x A\* grades.
- More students than ever achieving 3 x A\*/A grades.
- 100% pass rate at A Level for the past 4 years.
- Results in vocational courses are beyond outstanding.



### Why are our results so strong?



- Outstanding systems in place to track progress, coupled with a pastoral system that responds quickly when student performance is a concern.
- Small class size compared with other local institutions.
- Outstanding careers, university and apprenticeship guidance, leading to motivated and determined students.
- Experienced staff who have taught our post 16 curriculum for many years.



## How do we compare to local colleges?




- Some young people feel that another establishment will be better for them than sixth form. We agree, that if a local college offers a course that we do not offer, then the young person should go to the college to study that course.
- However, if the young person is going to a college, for example, to do a course that we offer then we feel that we should point out that in every reporting measure in both progress and attainment ACHS does better in A level and GCSE than all the other colleges around us. This includes any Sports Academies that are run by the colleges as well.
- Whilst college is different, the simple fact is the qualifications you take next set you up for life outside of education. You need to ask yourself, where am I going to get the best grades to go to university or get myself a quality apprenticeship?
- Finally, in terms of student destinations, ACHS has a higher percentage who move into apprenticeships or university study than the local colleges.

#### The decision making process



- We will as a Senior Leadership Team ensure that we give guidance to your child and if we feel that they are making the wrong decision then we will say so and explain why.
- Sometimes the decision to leave ACHS is the right one and if that's the case we will say so and support your child. What we want more than anything else is to help you and your child make the best decision for them.
- I recommend this sixth form, without reservation, and I would send my family here.



#### Is sixth form just more of the same?



- In the sixth form, you are given far more responsibility.
- You get to choose ALL your subjects.
- You will have more adult relationships with your teaching staff.
- You can study subjects that are not available in the lower school.
- Significant opportunities outside of the curriculum that prepare you for life beyond our sixth form.
- When you are not in lessons or Independent Study you can leave the school building.



### **Pathways**



- A Level Pathway Choose 3 A Level subjects. A small number of students wish to study 4.
- BTEC Pathway Choose 3 vocational BTEC or Cambridge Technical courses.
- Combined Level 3 pathway Choose a combination of A Level and BTEC or Cambridge Technical courses.

### A typical student timetable



- There are 50 possible teaching hours per fortnight.
- Each subject typically receives 9 hours per fortnight of taught lessons.
- There are also 9 hours per fortnight allocated to independent study.
- Therefore, a student who studies 3 subjects will receive 36 hours of directed study and will therefore have 14 'free periods'.
- Students are free to sign out of school during free periods.



- Become a qualified Pool Life Guard.
- Charity fund raising events every year, led by sixth form students.





## Exceptional information, advice and guidance



- Close relationships with RGS to support university applications.
- Access to supported entry schemes at Northumbria, Newcastle and Durham Universities.
- UCAS club every Thursday to support university applications.
- Regular visits from apprenticeship providers.
- Visits from working professionals industrial chemists, financial advisors, accountants, doctors etc...
- Interviews with our Senior Leadership Team to make sure you are on the right course for you.

### We are in the best position to support you in year 12 because:

- We have taught you for at least the last three years and we know your strengths and weaknesses.
- We already have strong relationships with you.
- Staff at ACHS are known for going the extra mile and will support you.
- A level classes are small compared with other schools.
- A generous sixth form bursary scheme.
- A FREE bus pass worth over £500 for students that live out of our catchment area.
