#### My Name is River

Dylan's mum thinks he's on the school Geography trip. Dylan's teacher thinks he's at home with the flu. In fact he's 30,000 feet up in the air on the way to Brazil.



This is a great travel book. Two boys go on a trip to Brazil, one to find his younger brother and the other to speak to the CEO of the multinational pharmaceutical company that has bought his family's farm in Wales. Without their parents' knowledge they board a plane and embark on an incredible adventure. Along with Floyd and Lucia, a street child Dylan meets in Salvador, they travel deep into the heart of the Amazon rainforest.

The plot kept me enthralled throughout. The descriptions of the rainforest are detailed and vivid. The importance of conservation is a theme running through the book, concerning not just the rainforest but Dylan's farm in Wales. It also touches on the plight of Brazil's street children and life in the shanty towns and favelas surrounding many major cities.

Above all though, it is a great adventure story.

he misses his grandma, who died last year.




Set in the North East, there are places in the book you might recognize - Lindisfarne, Marsden Rock and the coast around Tynemouth.

### The Afterwards

A close friendship between two girls comes to a sudden end when Ness dies tragically and unexpectedly. Her friend Ember, in her confusion and grief, searches for answers and a way to turn back time or reverse the tragic events.



In a beautifully written and illustrated book, Ember's search for answers through her trips into the afterworld are cleverly told. You are never quite sure whether the events have actually taken place or whether they are simply her imagination playing tricks on her as she tries to comprehend the awfulness of what has happened.

Although this is a lovely book, dealing with friendship and grief, it may be one for a parent to read first, especially if you have suffered a recent bereavement yourself. It will certainly provoke discussion but may be a way to bring healing and closure.
