#### **AQA English Literature GCSE**

Two examinations:

Paper 1: Shakespeare and the 19th-century novel

1 hour and 45 minutes

40% of final grade

Section A: 30 marks + SPAG (4) Much Ado About Nothing

Section B: 30 marks - A Christmas Carol

Paper 2: Modern Texts and Poetry

2 hours and 15 minutes

60% of final grade

Section A: 30 marks + SPAG (4) An Inspector Calls/Lord of the Flies

Section B: 30 marks - Power and Conflict Anthology

Section Ci: 24 marks – unseen poetry analysis

Section Cii: 8 marks – unseen poetry comparison



#### **AQA English Language GCSE**

Two examinations: 1 hour and 45 minutes each.

15 minutes reading time and 45 minutes to answer each section.

Section B must be answered first.

Paper 1: Explorations in Creative Reading and Writing (one extract)

50% of final grade

Section A: 40 marks – reading skills

Section B: 40 marks – writing skills: descriptive or narrative

Paper 2: Writers Viewpoints and Perspectives (two extracts)

50% of final grade

Section A: 40 marks – reading skills

Section B: 40 marks – writing skills: to present a viewpoint



Paper 1: Question 1 (AO1) (5 mins)

- Identify relevant explicit information
- You can copy/lift from the text
- Students must use a full sentence with a pronoun (he/she/it/they)
- No quotation marks



Paper 1: Question 2 (AO2) (15 mins)

- Language analysis
- Identify two/three pieces of language relevant to the question focus
- Must use short evidence
- You must use accurate terminology
- You must explain the effect on the reader



Paper 1: Question 3 (AO3) (10 mins)

- Structural analysis
- Identify the focus of each paragraph
- Look for time shifts/chronology
- Consider the ending and the closing
- Identify any recurring motifs or symbols
- You must explain why the text is structured in the way it is

Paper 1: Question 4 (AO4) (30 mins) 20 marks

- Evaluative analysis
- Always agree with the statement
- Include evidence from the text
- Analyse and comment on the methods used by the writer
- Aim to evaluate which methods create a more convincing effect

Paper 1: Question 5 (AO5/6) (45 mins) 40 marks

- Writing to describe or narrative writing
- Quality of writing is being assessed
- Varied paragraph lengths: one word/one sentence
- Varied sentence openers
- Accurate SPAG varied punctuation (!?:;...)
- Ambitious and varied vocabulary
- Consciously crafted use of linguistic devices



Paper 2: Question 1 (AO1) (5 mins)

- Explicit information
- Identify four correct statements



Paper 2: Question 2 (AO1) (10 mins)

- Summary task
- Identify key differences/similarities first
- Write about both sources in the same paragraph, showing the clear differences between them
- Use evidence
- Show some inference and perceptive understanding



Paper 2: Question 3 (AO2) (15 mins)

- Language analysis
- Identify two/three pieces of language relevant to the question focus
- Must use short evidence
- You must use accurate terminology
- You must explain the effect on the reader



#### Paper 2: Question 4 (AO3) (30 mins)

- Comparison of writers' viewpoints/opinions/perspectives
- Read the question very carefully what are you being asked to compare?
- Write about both texts within the same paragraph
- Compare similar or linked ideas where possible
- Comment on the methods used by the writers to present their ideas
- What is the overall tone of each text?



Paper 2: Question 4 (AO3) (30 mins)

16 marks

Use this formula as a starting point to structure your paragraphs:

Analysis of methods used from the evidence

**Connective** 

**Source B point** 

**Source B evidence**

## Paper 2: Question 5 (AO5/6) (45 mins) 40 marks

- Writing to explain a point of view
- Quality of writing is being assessed
- Heading and sub headings
- Varied paragraph lengths: one word/one sentence
- Varied sentence openers
- Accurate SPAG varied punctuation (!?:;...)
- Ambitious and varied vocabulary
- Consciously crafted use of linguistic devices





#### **Practical tips and advice**

- 1. Your son/daughter must learn the specific skills needed to answer each question in Section A of both papers.
- 2. Timings! Using the Paper 1 and 2 booklets, ensure your son/daughter keeps to the clear time guidelines to ensure they don't spend too long on a particular question.
- 3. Writing practice. Your son/daughter can practice writing individual paragraphs or openings and closings for the past paper questions that they have.
- 4. Test your son/daughter on key quotations for both characters and themes for the Literature set texts
- 5. Test your son/daughter on the links between poems so that they make relevant choices in the pressure of the exam.
