After period 1 and 2 you'd have a 20 minute break, at this time the canteen is open and they have snacks that are available at break. After you'd have period 3 and 4, then a 40 minute lunch, for year 5 and 6s they have a 20 minute break at the beginning of Lunch and then year 7 and 8s have it afterwards till the end of lunchtime.

Then we have a 20 minute AOW (Act Of Worship). 3 days a week we have our AOW with our Tutor, otherwise we have an assembly. After we have 5th period then end of day.

SUMMER RECIPE: GREEK SALAD

You need ...

200g pasta

- 1 tsp dried oregano 3 tbsp olive oil
- 16-20 cherry tomatoes
- 1 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 7Eg alivea pittad
- 75g olives, pitted
- ¹/₂ small cucumber
- 1 red onion

100g feta cheese



This is an easy and safe recipe where children can help you prepare and cook the ingredients, giving confidence with their chopping skills and using the cooker!

<u>Step 1:</u>

Fill a medium <u>saucepan</u> with hot water from the tap until it's three-quarters full. Set the pan on the hob. Season the water with a pinch of salt, then turn the heat to medium-high – the water should start to boil after a minute or so.

<u>Step 2:</u>

carefully stir the pasta -this will prevent the pasta from sticking together.Set a timer for 10 mins. Stir the pasta every minute or so.

<u>Step 3:</u>

While the pasta cooks, measure 3 tbsp extra virgin olive oil, 1 tbsp red wine vinegar and 1 tsp dried oregano into a <u>mixing</u> <u>bowl</u>. Season with some salt and black pepper, and mix well – this will make a zingy dressing for the pasta.

<u>Step 4 :</u>

When the timer beeps, it's time to check if the pasta is cooked. To do this, scoop one piece of pasta out of the boiling water using the wooden spoon, tip it onto a plate and leave it to cool slightly. Taste the pasta: if it's soft, it's cooked through, but if it's still a little hard in the middle, it needs to cook for a bit longer. Set the timer for another 2 mins, then check again.

<u>Step 5:</u>

Leave to cool for a few minutes in the colander, then tip the pasta into the mixing bowl with the dressing. Mix together until the pasta is coated in the dressing.

<u>Step 6:</u>

Cut the cherry tomatoes in half.Slice the pitted olives in the same way, then tip all the tomatoes and olives into the pasta.Cut the cucumber lengthwise.

Cut each piece in half again, so you have four long, chunky pieces. Cut across the cucumber pieces in the other direction so you end up with small cucumber triangles. Tip these into the bowl with the pasta, tomatoes and olives.

<u>Step 7:</u>

Cut the onions and tip them in the bowl and crumble the feta cheese into small pieces over the bowl, then gently mix everything together until well combined. Eat straightaway, or chill for up to a day before eating.
