

**PSHE including RSHE Consultation Results - November 2021**

<b><u>You said...</u></b>	<b><u>We did...</u></b>
72% of parents/carers said they would like to or would be interested in attending a PSHE consultation event.	Consultation event will be scheduled for the Spring term.
<p>You felt these topics needed to be in our curriculum</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Relationships with peers including peer pressure</li> <li>- What is ok and what is not ok</li> <li>- How to walk away from a situation</li> <li>- Different people in the world e.g. deaf, mute, disabled etc</li> <li>- Bullying</li> <li>- Racism</li> <li>- Race and ethnicity</li> <li>- Mental health awareness</li> <li>- Medicines being a legal drug</li> <li>- People identifying themselves as a preferred gender</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Autumn term has a focus on relationships in all classes. Peer pressure is explicitly taught in years 2, 3 and 6.</li> <li>- This is taught through the NSPCC pants rule in Key Stage 1. This is also taught in years 3, 4, 5 and 6.</li> <li>- This is taught in all year groups through the safe relationships unit.</li> <li>- This is addressed in school through all aspects of school life, including through our values and British Values. It is explicitly taught in years 2, 4, 5 and 6.</li> <li>- We teach a whole unit on mental health and well being in the summer term. In classes, we use a lot of strategies from different organisations including the Anna Freud website to help children develop an awareness of their mental health.</li> <li>- Medicines and vaccines are taught in years 2 and 5.</li> <li>- This is taught through school through the children being taught about respecting differences and is explicitly taught in years 5 and 6.</li> </ul>
<p>Areas for development</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Puberty/sex education to be taught by a teacher of the same gender with the children in groups of boys and girls</li> <li>- Parent training sessions</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Children in Year 4, 5 and 6 will now have the majority of their RSHE curriculum taught to them as a class but they will have the opportunity to have some sessions where they are with children and a member of staff of the same gender.</li> <li>- At the parental consultation, this will be further explored to see which topics parents would like support/training on</li> </ul>
<p>Other comments</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- A more detailed breakdown of the curriculum</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- All Autumn and Spring objectives for all classes will be available on the class webpage and PSHE page by January.</li> <li>- There will be a detailed newsletter sent out at the start of each term detailing the topics being taught in the year groups that term.</li> </ul>
