Focus Units: Writing: Narrative – myth Children will write their own Greek myth incorporating previous language and grammar features of powerful adjectives, conjunctions, fronted adverbials, and speech that bring their descriptive writing alive. We will also include figurative language such as similes and metaphors to add to our narrative writing skills. Reading: Authorial choice We will analyse language choices made by the author to discuss purpose and effect. Our key focus will be on figurative language to link with our writing, discussing why certain similes or metaphors are used by the author.	 Read and write decimals Compare decimals Recognise equivalence between decimals and fractions. Add and subtract numbers that have decimal place digitals. Round decimal digitals to the nearest whole number. 	Focus: Plants To build on our knowledge from previous years, we will explore the life cycle of plants. We will understand that plants have male and female parts and what these parts are responsible for in reproduction. We will also look at various ways seed dispersal can happen.	Focus: Ancient Greeks Children will explore how the Ancient Greeks influenced the world. They will find out where the civilisation fits into the historical timeline they have been building in history and build up a strong understanding of the rich culture the Ancient Greeks developed.

We will focus on investigating existing products, creating a design criteria for the children's own product, designing and creating a Greek inspired dish where children will adapt the recipe with their own chosen flavours and evaluate the final product.	Watch, Move, Connect develops key movement skills like throwing, catching, running, and landing, helping children apply them in game situations such as rallying and tracking in rounders. Lend, Move, Score focuses on attacking and defending in invasion games, refining skills like passing, kicking, and dribbling in various game formats.	Revision of Year 4 scheme of work including days, of the week, months of the year and hobbies.	This unit looks at how a flat-file database can be used to organise data in records. Pupils use tools within a database to order and answer questions about data. They create graphs and charts from their data to help solve problems. They use a real-life database to answer a question, and present their work to others.	Pupils learn about stereotyping, including gender stereotyping, and how it is influenced by social media and the wider world. They build an understanding of discrimination and prejudice to know how this can make people feel. This unit explores discriminatory language and children are taught what to do if they experience this.	In lessons, develop an understanding of the inter-related dimensions of music and musical vocabulary while improvising musical patterns and exploring jazz. Additionally, we will compose and notate music inspired by lyrics and poetry.	What do Christians believe about the old and new covenants? Children will explore key Christian stories about covenants with Abraham, Moses, David, and Jesus, examining Christian beliefs and comparing them with how other Abrahamic faiths understand these stories.
