	in the beginning - God started creation

	God only had one simple instruction for Adam and Eve. They were free to eat from any tree in the garden, except for one.
	This tree was referred to as the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

If God is everywhere why go to a place of worship? (expressing)	 Know what a place of worship is Know some facts about the Anglican church Know some facts about a Baptist church Know some differences between an Anglican and Baptist church and how their beliefs may differ. Know what a mandir is Know what a Hindu home shrine is Know why Hindus would come to the mandir or worship at home. The mandir has sadhus (holy men), a huge space, a gate and steps and shikara (towers reaching to the sky). Both home and mandir worship involve water, food, the OM sound, a murti, a bell and a lamp. Murti: the image, statue or carving of a god in Hinduism. A 'murti' is a representation of the god, but when worship begins, Hindus believe the spirit of the god enters the image. Puja: Hindi word for worship OM: the sound of God, Hindus say when they worship or meditate to bring their minds to God. 'synagogue' = 'house of assembly' (a place to get together), and 'schul' = school (a place to learn) Know 2 different - Orthodox (traditional) or Reform (modernised). Differences: Reform: men and women sit together, some services in English, might be a choir, girls' heads uncovered, bimah close to Ark. Orthodox: service in Hebrew, no choir/ instruments, men and women separate, all men and women's heads covered, bimah in centre. Similarities: presence of the Torah scrolls in the Ark, the bimah, the Ner Tamid (eternal light), the 10 commandments, men wear skull caps and prayer shawls.

Is it better to express your beliefs in arts and architecture or charity and generosity?(expressing)	 To know the first two mosques in the UK were built in 1889, in Liverpool and Woking Over the last 125 years, more and more mosques have opened: there are about 1750 in 2016. There are about 30 000 church buildings, as a point of comparison) They serve the Muslim community, which is about 4.5% of the people in the UK, about 2.7 million people. To think how mosques are decorated and how this might affect someone's thoughts and feelings.

What matters most to Christians and Humanists? (living)	• Humanists do not believe in a god. They believe it is possible to live a good and fulfilling life without following a traditional religion. They do not follow a holy book either. Instead, Humanists value traits like reason and rely on science to explain the way things are.
What difference does it make to believe in Ahisma (harmlessness), Grace (the generosity of God) and Ummah (community)?	 Muslims are committed to being part of the global 'Ummah', the worldwide Muslim family. They stick together, they are one under Allah. Christians are committed to believing in God's grace, or generosity. They think God forgives everyone who truly repents. Hindus are committed to Ahimsa, or harmlessness. They try to live life without killing or harming anything that lives. Prophet Muhammed is so important to Muslims because Allah spoke to him, the Qu'ran was revealed to him, he is a role model of how best to live. The 4 ways of sharing according to the Muslim Ummah are Zaqat and Qurbani, chrity, Hajj and sharing of stories. Gandhi was a Hindu who believed in and was committed to the principle of ahimsa, meaning harmlessness or non-violence.
	Ahimsa is about harmlessness, but is positive too: about serving others generously
