Aims

At Shelley First School, we believe that PSHE helps to give pupils the knowledge, skills and understanding they need to lead confident, healthy, independent lives, in order to become informed, active and responsible citizens. At Shelley we have chosen to adopt the Jigsaw scheme of learning for PSHE and RSE. The work we do in PSHE also flows through all other curriculum areas including assemblies. Under the guidance issued by the DfE, by September 2020, Relationships Education at primary school will be compulsory.

We believe that, to be effective, RSE should always be taught within a broader PSHE education programme. RSE enhances and is enhanced by learning related to topics including anti-bullying; keeping safe on and off line; keeping physically and mentally healthy, learning about drugs, alcohol and tobacco; and the development of skills and attributes such as communication skills, managing peer pressure, risk management, resilience and decision making.

The aims of PSHE and RSE at Shelley First School are to:

- Promote the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of all.
- Prepare pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life.
- Encourage pupils to value themselves and others.
- Allow pupils to acknowledge and appreciate difference and diversity.
- Teach pupils how to make informed choices.
- Prepare pupils to be positive and active members of a democratic society.
- Teach pupils to understand what constitutes a safe and healthy lifestyle.
- Provide a framework in which sensitive discussions can take place.
- Promote safety in forming and maintaining relationships.
- Provide pupils with a toolkit for understanding and managing their emotions.
- Provide pupils with the opportunities to consider issues which may affect their own lives and/or the lives of others.

- Help pupils to identify the characteristics of healthy relationships, how relationships may affect mental and physical health; and how to stay safe online.
- Help pupils develop feelings of self-respect, confidence and empathy.
- Create a positive culture around issues of sexuality and relationships.
- Teach pupils the correct vocabulary to describe themselves and their bodies.

<u>PSHE</u>

At Shelley First School, we teach Personal, Social, and Health Education as a wholeschool approach to underpin children's development as people and because we believe that this also supports their learning capacity.

The Jigsaw Programme offers us a comprehensive, carefully thought-through Scheme of Work which brings consistency and progression to our children's learning in this vital curriculum area. The overview of the programme can be seen on the school website.

This also significantly contributes to the school's Safeguarding and Equality Duties, the Government's British Values agenda and the SMSC (Spiritual, Moral, Social, and Cultural) development opportunities provided for our children.

The Jigsaw Programme is aligned to the PSHE Association Programmes of Study for PSHE.

What do we teach when and who teaches it?

Whole-school approach

Jigsaw covers all areas of PSHE for the primary phase including statutory Relationships and Health Education. The table below gives the learning theme of each of the six Puzzles (units) and these are taught across the school; the learning deepens and broadens every year.

| Term | Puzzle (Unit) | Content |
|-----------|---------------------------|---|
| Autumn 1: | Being Me in My World | Includes understanding my own identity and how I fit well in the class, school and global community. Jigsaw Charter established. |
| Autumn 2: | Celebrating Difference | Includes anti-bullying (cyber and homophobic bullying included) and understanding |
| Spring 1: | Dreams and Goals | Includes goal-setting, aspirations, who do I want to become and what would I like to do for work and to contribute to society |
| Spring 2: | Healthy Me | Includes drugs and alcohol education, self- esteem and confidence as well as healthy lifestyle choices, sleep, nutrition, rest and exercise |

| Summer 1: | Relationships | Includes understanding friendship, family and other relationships, conflict resolution and communication skills, bereavement and loss |

Enrichment

Our PSHE curriculum is enriched via our creative arts week, community cohesion events, careers weeks and democracy weeks to name a few.

How do we teach about consent?

Teaching about consent needs to be part of a spiral PSHE education programme, building developmentally from early years, through key stages 1 and then 2.

To ensure the topic is revisited regularly and consent becomes a common theme in school; we have highlighted opportunities to discuss topics where they are naturally mentioned and taught in our original LTP.

Learning in key stages 1 and 2 at Shelley First we ensure we tackle the basics the foundations around consent; This includes simple rules for staying safe online, not keeping adults; secrets, only surprises, who and how to tell if they are worried or uncomfortable about something, recognising what kinds of physical touching is acceptable and unacceptable.

In teaching the basics of consent as we embrace this area of priority we have created a progression grid of vocabulary that is age and stage appropriate but will ensure that these words are mentioned regularly, used in context and the children are secure with their meaning.

The children's voice and knowledge has helped us understand where we need to personalise the curriculum for Shelley First.

Monitoring and Review

The Curriculum Committee of the governing body monitors this policy on an annual basis. This committee reports its findings and recommendations to the full governing body, as necessary, if the policy needs modification. The Curriculum Committee gives serious consideration to any comments from parents about the PSHE (RSHE) programme, and makes a record of all such comments. Governors scrutinise and ratify teaching materials to check they are in accordance with the school's ethos.

<u>Equality</u>

This policy will inform the school's Equalities Plan.

The DfE Guidance 2019 (p. 15) states, "Schools should ensure that the needs of all pupils are appropriately met, and that all pupils understand the importance of equality and respect. Schools must ensure they comply with the relevant provisions of the Equality Act 2010 under which sexual orientation and gender reassignment are amongst the protected characteristics...

At the point at which schools consider it appropriate to teach their pupils about LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender), they should ensure this content is fully integrated into their programmes of study for this area of the curriculum rather than delivered as a stand-alone unit or lesson. Schools are free to determine how they do this, and we expect all pupils to have been taught LGBT content at a timely point as part of this area of the curriculum".

At Shelley First School we promote respect for all and value every individual child. We also respect the right of our children, their families and our staff, to hold beliefs, religious or otherwise, and understand that sometimes these may be in tension with our approach to some aspects of Relationships, Health and Sex Education.
