Yet again, as a school community we have to come together to support each other, and to find a sensible way through the latest directives and guidance.

On a positive note, we are pleased to share with you that staff from Shenstone Lodge, along with the other special schools in Sandwell are eligible to receive the Coronavirus vaccine as a priority group.

This is a significant 'game changer' with regard to establishing opening of the two sites. Once the majority of staff are vaccinated we would hope to quickly increase our student numbers as immunity to the Coronavirus is established.
