In October, we had our long-awaited Ofsted monitoring visit which provided us with the opportunity to demonstrate just how far we have come since the last graded inspection of March 2022. While we recognise that we are not yet where we aim to be and that we are still on a journey of improvement, it is important to remember that the school we are now is a world away from the school I joined 18 months ago and this is thanks to the hard work and dedication of the staff - all of whom are committed to ensuring that every student has the opportunity to develop academically, spiritually and culturally. This is something that the inspector saw firsthand when he met with a wide range of students of his own choosing. Our children were as straight-talking as ever and were a credit to us and to you for the way they expressed their views on what we do well and how we can further improve.

I am delighted to share that we received the best possible feedback and the inspector was confident that we are on track to be an Ofsted 'Good' school in the next graded inspection. I would like to thank all of the staff, students, parents and guardians for their dedication and support. Sir William Stanier is more than just a building. It is the sum total of the people in it and those others who are committed to wanting us to succeed. I am really excited about the next phase of our development. Here's to even more progress next year!

Food for thought...

The term has been a very busy but enjoyable one in the Food department.



We have welcomed many of our new Year 7 students by introducing them to the food rooms and we have worked hard to enhance the curriculum by including lots of extra-curricular visits and activities.

We were delighted to be selected by the chef Jamie Oliver and his team to be one of only a handful of schools in England to pilot his new project: The Jamie Oliver Ministry of Cooking. This project will be introduced to other schools in September 2024, but SWS is first in line as we have access to the resources and recipes much earlier. As a part of the pilot, we have trialled Jamie's new recipes through our afterschool cooking club. Students in Year 7 have enjoyed making pancakes, fajitas, tomato soup and a spaghetti dish - amongst many other culinary delights. We may have a few budding Jamie Olivers of our own - watch this space!





We have also continued with our community support. As always, we were very proud and delighted that our students used their culinary skills in making a coconut and jam sponge traybake that was then served at the charity Chance Changing Lives for the homeless and needy Saturday evening meal. This is a local charity that relies on the support from local people to keep it running and makes such a difference to people's lives when they are facing challenging times. The dish was met with great reviews and it is something that we will continue to plan for on a regular basis.

Year 9 and 10 students were involved in an exciting cooking challenge with a team from the Royal Navy who tested their culinary and teamwork skills with a food challenge. It was an exciting activity where the winners appreciated the prestige of being named the best by the Royal Navy crew. We were delighted by the ways in which the SWS students stepped up to the challenge.

This was matched only by the extravaganza that was Halloween! Great fun was had by all when we let students loose to decorate the rooms and make tempting Halloween treats.





SWS also hosted a seafood special when we were chosen as one of the 250 schools to receive a delivery of Mussels from Offshore Shellfish; a sustainable mussel farm. Students learned about nutrition & health, as well as how to cook mussels perfectly. They were grateful to the Food Teachers' Centre for organising this opportunity as many agreed that mussels wouldn't have been their first choice of ingredient.

In a return to form, however, Food students have all made a variety of sweet treats to celebrate Christmas. Snowmen and reindeer cupcakes were on the menu, along with candy cane biscuits, while KS4 students also made a savoury sausage wreath with their own homemade flaky pastry. Delicious!



tailored trousers or tailored shorts or a skirt. Skirts must be at a respectful and appropriate length, they must be a standard school skirt and not

No tight fitting ("slim/ skinny fit") trousers are permitted (even though they can be found in some uniform sections of some stores). Jeans, tracksuit bottoms, leggings or jeggings are not permitted.

A black SWS V-necked school jumper. No hoodies! No other alternative, non-school jumpers.

SWS school tie which has a different colour for each year group.

Sensible plain black shoes or plain black trainers. No colours at all on the black trainers. No different coloured soles or different coloured brand logos. No dark grey trainers.

Pierced ears should have stud earrings only, no hooped or dangly earrings. One small nose stud (not two) is permitted. No nose rings at all. No other piercings or jewellery are permitted; this includes rings, necklaces and bracelets.

Nail polish, acrylic or false nails are only permitted if they are natural in colour (no colours including white) and of an appropriate length, no more than half a centimetre of length beyond the finger tip.

Extreme hair colours or styles are not permitted. Subtle, natural looking

make-up is permitted. No false eyel<u>ashės.</u>
