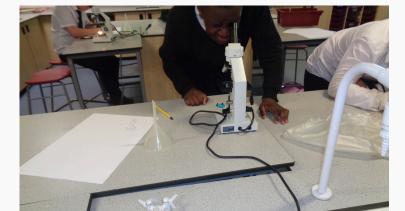

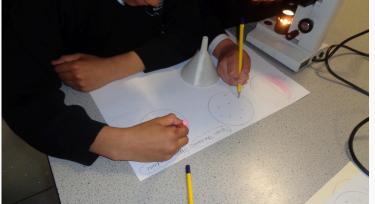
I hope you all have a relaxing half term break and we look forward to welcoming everyone back to school on Monday 3rd June.

The upcoming May half-term will offer additional masterclasses, providing focused support to help refine their knowledge and boost confidence before the exams.

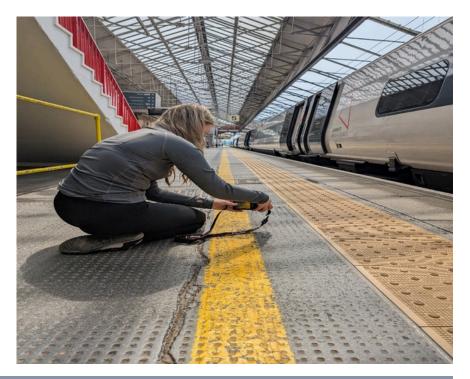


Let's keep supporting our Year 11 students as they approach this crucial phase. They have truly been a credit to our school, demonstrating that their potential is boundless.

Art with UTC and Leighton Academy











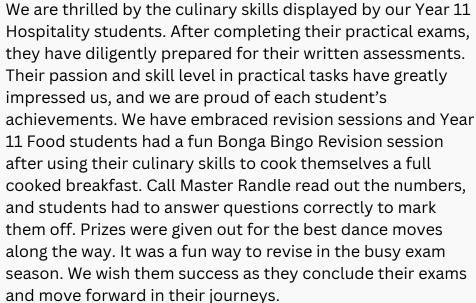

Performing Arts

In Performing Arts, we are excited to share the incredible activities that our students have been involved in this term.









GCSE Students have been given the opportunity to explore their instruments with the tutors from Love Music Trust in the Peripatetic Music lessons. Year 10 have been working on their solo performances in preparation for the recording at the end of Half Term 6, which will be a part of their GCSE portfolio. Whilst Year 11 have been using the time to prepare with some extra Music revision in preparation for their GCSE written exam on the 17th June. There are now quite a few students in KS3 that are partaking in peripatetic Music lessons on a range of different instruments. If students wish to have lessons on an instrument of their choice, they should see Mrs Gaffney, who will provide them with the details.

KS3 Music students have been looking at contrasting topics across all year groups including, Titanic in Year 7, Samba Music in Year 8 and Musicals in Year 9. Students have been really engaged in Music lessons this half term and have been learning different skills with a variety of instruments at their fingertips – including singing!

Year 10 Music students have been involved in a project this half term with Higher Horizons and have been focusing on music festivals and making music thus far. They are still to participate in sessions focusing on recording music, marketing and the music business and DJing. This has been a successful project so far and students are learning a variety of skills such as teamwork, communication and creativity (and much more!), which are all skills that are incredibly important in the Performing Arts industry.

This half term in Drama, Year 8 have been exploring Frantic Assembly's adaptation of The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time. They have been deepening their empathy and understanding of hidden disabilities and working together to accomplish seamless lifts. Year 9 have been exploring devising and creating their own performances based around social issues such as: online bullying, homelessness and poverty. These pieces were all created by the students' themselves and aimed to educate their audiences on these issues and how we can work together as a community to stop them.

School Uniform Reminder: 2023 - 2024











Plain white collared shirt/blouse tucked into trousers or skirt.

Plain charcoal grey, or black tailored trousers or tailored be at a respectful and appropriate length, they must be a standard school skirt and not lycra.

No tight fitting ("slim/ skinny fit") trousers are permitted (even though they can be found in some uniform sections of some stores). Jeans, tracksuit bottoms, leggings or jeggings are not permitted.

A black SWS V-necked school jumper. No hoodies! No other alternative, non-school jumpers.

SWS school tie which has a different colour for each year group.

Sensible plain black shoes or plain black trainers. No colours at all on the black trainers. No different coloured soles or different coloured brand logos. No dark grey trainers.

Pierced ears should have stud earrings only, no hooped or dangly earrings. One small nose stud (not two) is permitted. No nose rings at all. No other piercings or jewellery are permitted; this includes rings, necklaces and bracelets.

Nail polish, acrylic or false nails are only permitted if colours including white) and of an appropriate length, no more than half a centimetre of length beyond the finger tip.

- Extreme hair colours or styles are not permitted.
