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

Being careful not to damage places or things.

Treating people in the way that you would like to be treated yourself.

What are the British Values?

The British values underpin what it is to be a British citizen in a modern and diverse Britain.

In the next few issues, we'll have a look at how each of the five British Values are promoted in our school. In this issue, we're focussing on respect.

What is Respect?

Being respectful means that you act in a way that shows care for how your actions may impact others. We can show respect for people, places, and things.

- Online (cyber) bullying.




PCSO Groves also visited the children in Upper Key Stage Two to talk about how to be respectful online.


