Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	21.4%	All children attended the year 4 curriculum swimming lessons and passed the safe-self rescue element
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	52.5%	Children all were exposed to back stroke and front crawl and most could sustain this for 10 metres but not 25.



What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	100%	They all demonstrated safe self-rescue during the swimming sessions
