Yik Yak Parent Guide

A quick guide to what you need to know

Yik Yak

What is it?

Yik Yak is a social media app that allows users to create and take part anonymously in discussion threads from users within a five mile radius. Threads are called 'Yaks'.

Users can 'upvote' and 'downvote' posts: the equivalent of liking and disliking. How much engagement your threads and posts receive constitute what is called 'Yakarma'.

Because it's **anonymous**, users within a thread are **identified with randomly generated icons**, such as a **sailboat**, **socks**, **compass** and so on. The **original poster** is identified with an **'original poster' icon**.

You can see, comment and upvote 'Nationwide Top Yaks', which are the most popular Yaks in your country. You cannot downvote these Yaks.

Yik Yak shut down in 2017 due to allegations of cyberbullying and downvoting posts that mentioned competitors, but was re-released in 2021.

What are the risks?

Yik Yak is designed to give users freedom to explore topics and opinions by allowing them total anonymity. Whilst this might be liberating in some way, it also means that users are able to post hateful or bullying content without being identified.

The **locality of the threads** can also be an issue. Although it's anonymous, **if your child did reveal personal information** or **discussed their exact location**, anyone within that thread could be **able to locate them**.

What safety features are there?

The new version of Yik Yak has **strict community guidelines**. If your child sees an **upsetting post**, they can 'downvote' the post and report it to moderators. If it breaks the guidelines or terms of service, the user can be immediately banned from the app.

Once a post reaches an **overall –5 in downvotes**, it will be **deleted**.

The new Yik Yak has a 'Cuss Buster' feature. When switched on, it will filter out swear words from all threads.

What else should I do?

Yik Yak is great for figuring out what's happening in an immediate area. The anonymity certainly does give users a level of freedom, but it's important to remind your child to be responsible.

Make sure that your child understands how to report a post, and encourage them to come to you if they encounter any unpleasant posts or comments.
