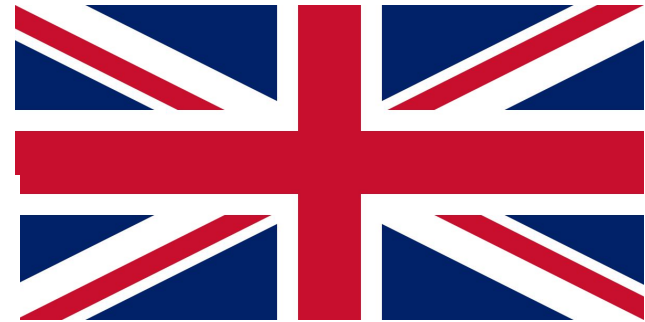

What does SCARF stand for?



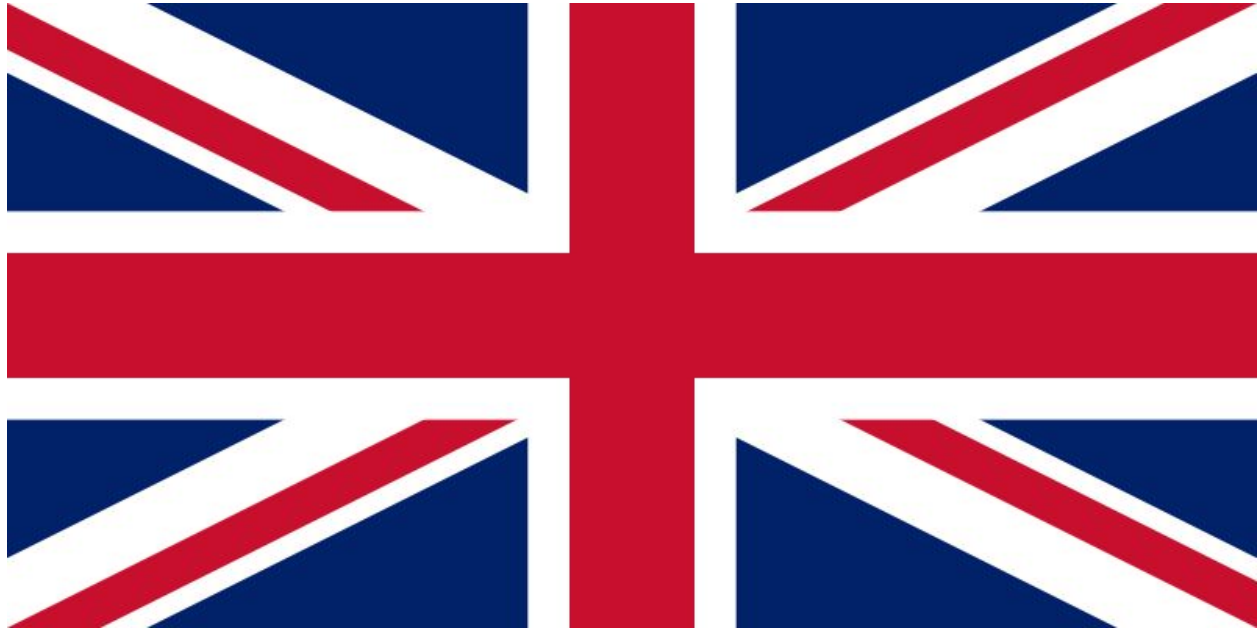
We have one lesson per week of PSHE.

Rule of Law

- I value and understand the importance of rules and laws
- I follow school rules and understand why there is a consequence if I do not
- I understand that everybody is responsible for rules and laws
- I know rules are there to protect me

What do I do if I don't think something is right or fair?

Mutual Respect and Tolerance

- I know my behaviour, actions and words can affect others
- I understand and respect that not everyone is the same as me and everyone needs to be treated as an individual
- I know that life is not the same for everyone
- I understand that people's faiths and beliefs are different, and I respect that

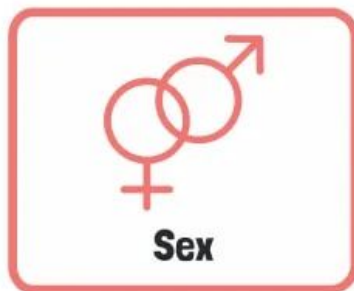

Protected Characteristics

What are some different types of discrimination?

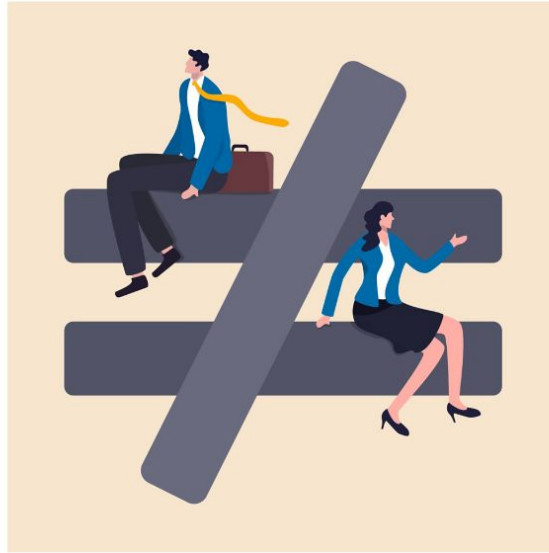
Discrimination takes lots of forms and is often shown through **negative behaviour** towards a person or group of people.

Racism



Unfair treatment of people due to their race or ethnic group.

Sexism



The unfair treatment of someone based on their sex or gender.

Disablism



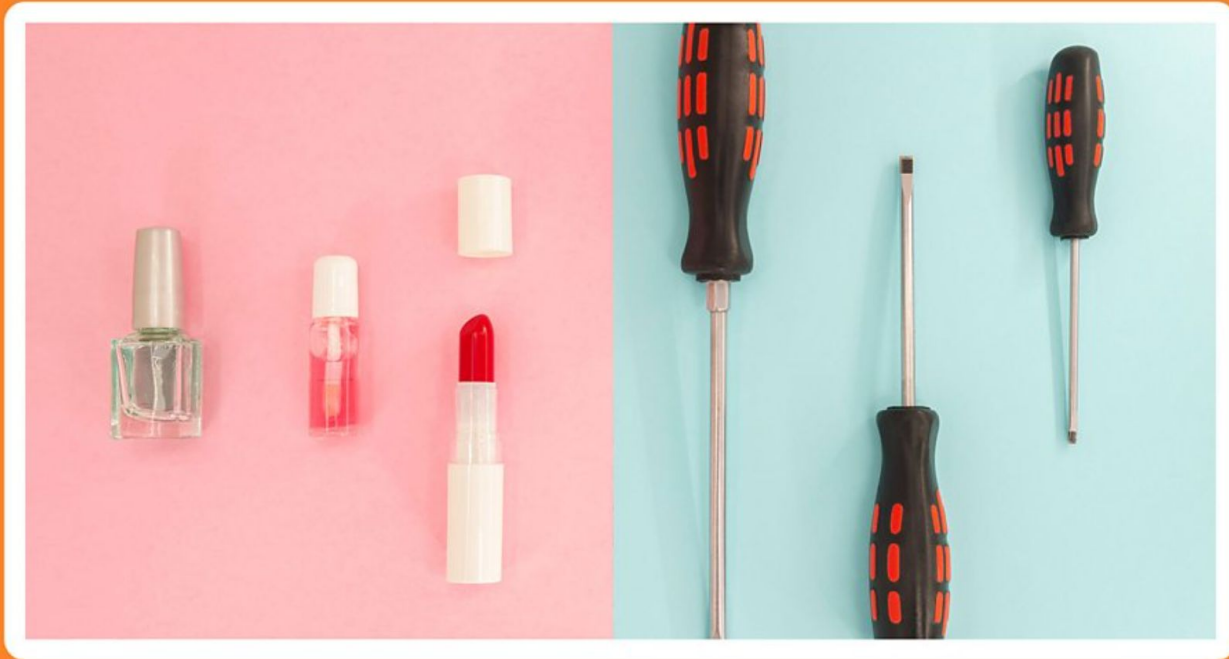
The unfair treatment of someone with seen or unseen disabilities.



Prejudice

This is when you have a negative opinion of someone or judge someone unfairly without even knowing them.

How do people show discrimination?



Stereotyping

This is often a negative or general belief that people from a certain group are all the same, all like the same things or all behave in the same way.

How do people show discrimination?



Exclusion

When a person or group is left out from something on purpose, this is exclusion. This could be not being allowed to take part in a particular activity, or simply being ignored by people in the community.

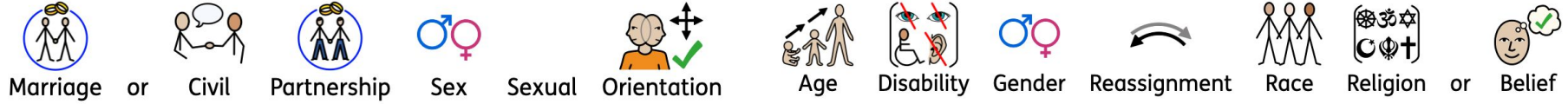
How do people show discrimination?



Bullying

Bullying is negative behaviour that aims to hurt somebody on purpose, either physically or emotionally. A 'bully' can feel they have power over the other person, so they keep hurting them.

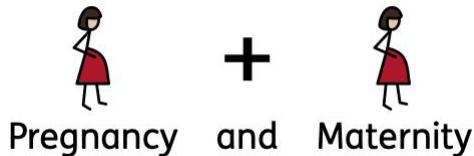
