
Summer preparation work -Post 16 students- Psychology

Welcome to the Wonderful World of Psychology..!







Psychology is a fascinating subject, the study of people, behaviour and the mind. It is a broad subject with many different areas. One subject area that you will study in year 1 is psychopathology.

To study this area, you need to consider what is normal in order to understand what is abnormal. Obviously this can be hard to define and has issues around who decides on what 'normal' is.

Task 1

Do an <u>internet search</u> on famous celebrities that you would consider to be <u>'abnormal'</u>. Why would you consider them to be abnormal? Make a <u>collage</u> of these celebrities with ideas written around them about what makes them abnormal. (This can be done on the computer, or you can print out pictures of celebrities and write your ideas around the pictures) If you don't have access to a printer just write the names of the celebrities and your idea around them in a mind map. The celebrities can be living and current or celebrities who have died. For example, Michael Jackson, Katie Price, Amy Winehouse and your own ideas. Why may they be considered to be 'abnormal'?

Task 2

Answer this next question in a paragraph

What do you think helps us to decide what is normal and what is not, who judges? Why do you think this may cause problems?

Task 3

The following people have all committed high profile crimes.

Choose one of these cases and research them. Consider and discuss the reasons why they may have carried out such horrific crimes. Think about the following explanations:
