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
General Information

- There will be a new parental communication app next week. More information to follow...


Key Stage 3

- The final cricket match of season. Over the past few months the students have been working hard practising their bowling, batting and catching skills.










Makaton - Sign of the Week

The Inclusive Choir

The Inclusive Choir is open to anyone up to age 25 and is free to join. We aim to be as inclusive as possible, and actively try to remove barriers to participation from those with severe and profound learning disabilities. The choir encourages participation and expression in any way, including using Makaton signing, singing, making sounds on instruments, using technology or through movement and dance. (It is therefore accessible to pre/non-verbal participants.)

The choir will rehearse in a mixture of face-to-face and online rehearsals so participants can join in however is best for them.
