The official date of the State Funeral is 19 September 2022. This day will be a bank holiday and school will close on this day as a mark of respect.

Gold Rights Respecting School Award

At the end of the academic year we achieved Rights Respecting School Award – Gold level. Thank you to Miss Atkins for leading this with staff, governors and children. I have listed some feedback below which validates this achievement.

It was evident that children's rights are embedded across the school and underpin every facet of school life.

Strengths of the school include:

- Articulate children who demonstrated good knowledge and understanding of rights and are committed to helping to realise these for other children locally and globally.
- Rights and global learning are embedded across the curriculum in a way that enriches the learning for all children.
- A strong commitment to children's rights and to RRSA from leaders at all levels, tied into the vision and values of the school.
- The caring and nurturing ethos of the school, where the values of dignity and respect are lived and valued by children and their parents.
- There are several different mechanisms for children to feed into decision making and leadership in different areas of school life. Children felt listened to, that their views matter and that they could make a positive difference.

Children said that relationships are positive, and teachers are fair when they sort out any issues. Teachers spoke about the school's restorative approach, "The children see things from each other's perspectives," and a TA said that when sorting out issues, "We give them the time and privacy so they can express themselves. Children were positive about their learning and said teachers try to make it fun and varied and help them to make progress, "We get lots of feedback on our learning and if you need help the teacher always comes to you." Child led, enquiry-based learning has been introduced and one child said, "We make choices. It's not just sitting down listening; we are part of the fun." A teacher added, "We've found that children are more engaged in their learning."

International School Award

What is happening in the classrooms?


EYFS We welcomed a full cohort of children into EYFS this week. They have embraced the opportunities in class and have shown great listening skills, quickly learning the routines in class. It has been super to see such friendly behaviours and to watch as they develop their cooperation and social skills.





Year 1

Swallowtail and Emperor class have enjoyed settling into their new routines in KS1. They have loved coming together as a year group, particularly for a Science walk where the children discussed the features of Autumn. They then split into small groups and walked around the school listening for sounds and looking for signs of Autumn. Back in the classroom the children recorded their findings beautifully. They are very much looking forward to swimming all together on Mondays.




Year 2 enjoyed a Friday sing-a-long treat, after working really hard this week! They even made a human bead-string to model number bonds to 20!





In **Year 3** this week we have been developing and expanding our knowledge within maths. We have been using manipulatives to help us visualise and solve a variety of problems.

Later on in the week, we designed and created our very own Mexican styled tablets. It was messy work, but we really enjoyed it.





Year 4 have begun their research of Brazil by using atlases to locate the country on a map and identify the neighbouring countries. The children have shown real enthusiasm for their learning and have generated some interesting questions which they would like to research over the course of the topic, such as "How much of the rainforest has been destroyed?" and "How many different species of animals live in the rainforest?"



Year 5 wrote letters to our link school in The Gambia - Brikama Lower Basic School. We told them about our lives and asked questions about what life is like in their country.

Year 6 have dived straight into the rich history of Guatemala and have been investigating the Mayan civilisation. Specifically looking at their temples, gods and locating the Mayan settlements on the map. We have explored this term's value of courage, creating a display of what courage means to us, which is to be showcased in St Andrew's church. The children are very excited to take up their roles as wellbeing ambassadors in the coming weeks, by supporting children throughout the school in any way they can.
