We achieved a silver award as a Rights Respecting School.

Well done to Miss Atkins and the team of staff and governors who supported the award. Here is some of the feedback.

Pupils gave several examples of rights from the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Children are able to learn about rights through displays, class charters and aspects of the curriculum.

There is a strategic commitment by the school to the principles of the Convention. The headteacher explained that "everything we do across the school links to being a rights respecting school" and that this complements the school's values and "dovetails into everything".

Staff, parents and governors are very supportive of St Andrew's rights respecting work. The wider school community is kept informed with information on the website, newsletters and there is also a RRSA link governor. Staff have received training and regular updates from the coordinator about the RRSA. Comments highlighting the positive impact of the school's rights respecting approach included how children's awareness and empathy towards others has grown and as the coordinator explained pupils are "aware that everybody has these rights" and "want to make a difference".

Respect is an integral part of the school's culture and everyday practice. A rights respecting ethos is also being promoted through the school's Christian values and expectations of being 'ready, respectful, safe'. Throughout the accreditation visit, a positive and supportive learning environment was evident and in discussions pupils listened carefully and respectfully to the contribution of their peers. Pupils understand that adults are responsible for ensuring that their rights are being facilitated and upheld. Examples given by pupils about how the school helps support their safety included the presence of staff, access to medical care and fire alarm procedures. Pupils are confident that if they had any concerns these would be listened to and taken seriously by staff. When asked, pupils confirmed that they felt safe at school. Learning about e-safety, visits from external organisations, access to 'worry boxes' in classes, 'anti-bullying week', and year 6 participating in a 'junior citizen' event are other examples of how the school supports pupils' safety.

'Pupil voice' is a strength of the school. Two pupil representatives from reception year and above are elected by their peers to form the school council. The council has helped to choose playground equipment, decided on charities to support, carried out learning walks, and with other pupils helps to produce the pupil newsletter. Children's views were taken into consideration when the school's new vision statement was being prepared and there are opportunities for pupils to be actively engaged in the life of the school through roles such as junior leaders (year 4), play leaders (year 5), anti-bullying buddies (years 4 and 5) and wellbeing ambassadors (year 6). Children's awareness of the wider world is being developed in a variety of ways including through assemblies and curriculum activities.
